

# Halton High School Teachers Fight Reville Recommendations

Halton county high school teachers are fighting recommendations in the Reville Report, which, according to Halton District 9, O.S.S.T.F. president Tom Ramautarsingh of Georgetown would restrict the teachers' bargaining powers.

The Reville report is the outcome of a three member committee of inquiry into conflict in teacher-school board relationships, and was headed by Judge F. W. Reville.

In the brief submitted by Halton County teachers to its provincial organization, which in turn prepared a brief for presentation to Minister of Education Robert Wells, the teachers objected to the scope of negotiations being limited only to salaries. They claimed compensation, teacher work load and the security of teachers' positions must be included.

Another area of disagreement was the recommendation which would allow the school boards to bring in anyone they wanted to help in negotiations with the teachers, but would limit the teachers to appointing a negotiating committee from among themselves.

**SAME RIGHTS**  
The District 9 brief took the position that its negotiating team has the same rights as those accorded the trustees. "The trustees can hire professional negotiators and the teachers are denied this basic right," said the brief. It pointed out the teachers could not call for assistance from their own provincial organization.

The brief took exception to the Reville recommendation that one body be appointed to negotiate for both elementary and secondary teachers, and insisted they wanted the present practice of negotiating for its own member high school teachers, maintained.

A recommendation in the Reville report for a provincially appointed tribunal, paid by the province to adjudicate in difficult salary disputes, found little favour. The teachers' brief agreed an arbitration board should be set up by consisting of one appointed by the trustees, one appointed by the O.S.S.T.F., and one independent chairman agreeable to both sides, and that a time limit be set.

**RESEARCH BUREAUS**  
A suggestion that govern-

ment-financed professional research bureaus be set up was also criticized. The teachers' brief recommended any such bureau should be financed by teachers and trustees, to keep them impartial, and to ensure information was readily available.

District 9, O.S.S.T.F. wants to negotiate for principals and vice principals, while the Reville report proposes a separation of teachers and principals for negotiations.

District 9 president said the principals have agreed they wish to continue to negotiate as members of the Teachers' Federation. "They are teachers first, then administrators," said Ramautarsingh.

**TO HELP RELATIONS**  
The Reville report also suggests that permanent school board advisory committees be established by the province to help trustee-staff relations.

The teachers' brief opposed this since the Board is under no obligation to accept their reports. "This dialogue will be in an unending process which will certainly lead to low morale and frustration to the teachers," said the brief.

The District 9 brief concluded by suggesting the scope of negotiations include all items

affecting the total cost of the educational enterprise. "To shift items which affect our students to advisory committees where discussions will take place interminably, merely circumvents the real issue", the brief concluded.

## Was Church Worker, Kid Hockey Coach

A Northern Electric employee and World War II army veteran, Charles Thomas Corcoran, 15 Mary Street, died suddenly October 27.

Mr. and Mrs. Corcoran and their daughters were visiting their son, hospitalized in Queensway General Hospital when he suffered a fatal heart seizure. He was 55.

Born in Orillia, son of Ed and Mary Theresa Sullivan Corcoran, he attended Guardian Angela school and Orillia Collegiate. Following army service, he settled in Toronto, where he married Alice Shayer in 1948. He joined the Orenda Engines firm in 1953, and in 1963 became a chemist with

Northern Electric at Bramalea. He moved to Georgetown in 1965.

Mr. Corcoran was active in Holy Cross parish as a member of the ushers club, and past president of the Riviera bingo club. He was an active member of Branch 120, Royal Canadian Legion, and had coached teams in the Legion's kid hockey league.

He leaves his wife, son Thomas of Toronto and daughters Charlotte and Monica of town; brothers Dennis of Toronto and Ted of London and sisters Mrs. William Stephenson (Mary) of Orillia, Mrs. Harry Reyce (Edna) of London and Mrs. Leonard Wilson (Verde) of Barrie.

Church October 30, and interment was in Greenwood Cemetery. Pallbearers were Tony Suchan, Clare Doyle, Joe Chapman, Dennis Lemay, Jim Boyle and Russ Kowalchuk.
