Guimond-Nurse Marriage In Hillcrest United Church

Church, October 7 at 2:30 p.m. in Hillcrest Church. It was a double ring ceremony, with joint service of the United and Roman Catholic churches.

The groom, son of Mr. and Mrs. Laurent Guimond of Fredericton, New Brunswick, who has been living in Scarborough, is an instrument technician and works for Ontario Hydro at the nuclear power plant at Pickering. The bride, only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harvey E. Nurse, R.R.2, Georgetown, is a third year student in radio and television arts at Ryerson Polytechnical Institute, Toronto.

Organist John Taylor played several selections preceding the service, breaking into "Trumpet Air" as the bride and her father approached the altar. Before the first words were spoken, soloist Brenda McNeil sang "Give Us This Day".

Given in marriage by her father, the bride wore a floor length empire style A-line gown of polyester silk. The bodice was overlaid with lace and adorned with seed pearls. The scooped neckline was inlaid with georgette and topped with a choker collar. The skirt was bordered around the bottom and vertically trimmed on the front with two rows of lace matching the bodice and sleeves.

She wore a Juliet cap covered with the silk and lace of her gown and trimmed with seed pearls. A waist-length four-tiered veil was gathered to the cap at back and sides.

She carried a bouquet of red sweetheart roses and stephanotis arranged in a crescent cross formation.

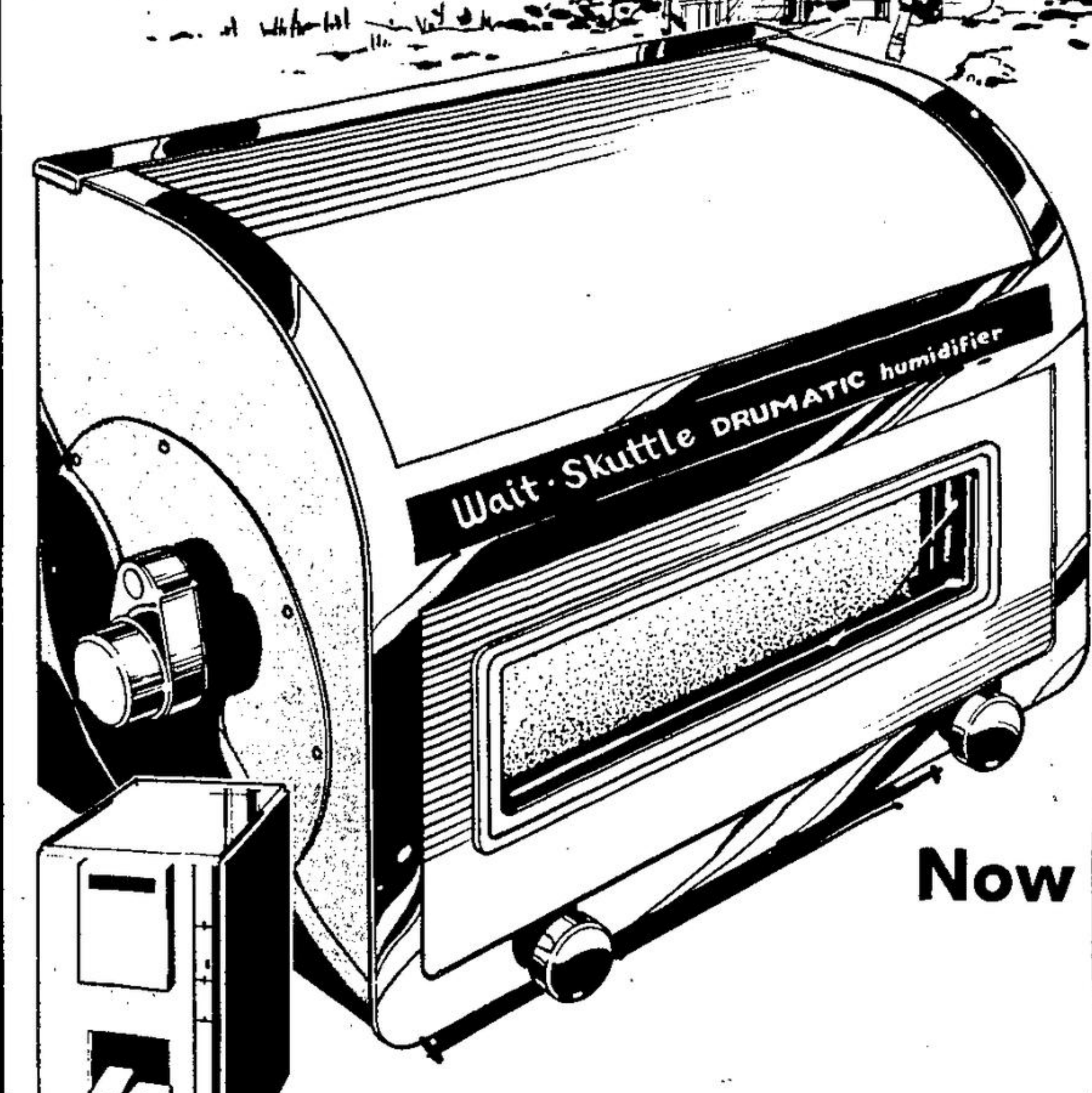
