Hold Annual Meeting More People than Ever Using the Bruce Trail

The 1972 annual general meeting of the Bruce Trail Association was held at Cedar Glen Camp near Bolton. The Toronto Bruce Trail Club was host to the 5,000 member association.

Dr. T. W. R. East of Waterloo was re-elected president, with vice-president Ken Young of Toronto, secretary Ray Lowes and treasurer George Robson, both of Hamilton.

Reports from various clubs indicate that the Trail is receiving increased use by the general public in all sections along the over 400 miles of its route. The increase in membership of the Association was some 25 percent above the previous year.

300 ACRES
In the course of the past year some 300 acres of escarpment

lands were secured under government agencies with the help of the BTA's Niagara Escarpment Preservation Fund. Under arrangements with the Ontario Government 25 percent of the purchase price of lands along the escarpment is matched by 75 percent of government funding.

The after dinner speaker was Lester Holmes, Executive Director of the Appalachian Trail Conference. Mr. Holmes gave a brief history of the Appalachian Trail from its inception in 1922. He outlined the methods used by the U.S. Federal Government for preserving the continuity of the trail. The basic instrument of preservation is the National Scenic Trails Act which was enacted in 1968. Close to 400 persons attended the annual

dinner and talk by Mr. Holmes.

Domtar Reports Rise In Sales Income

Montreal — Domtar Limited reported today that net income for the third quarter of this year was \$4.3 million, or 28 cents per common share, compared with \$2.1 million, or 13 cents, in the same period a year ago.

Sales and other revenues totalled \$141.5 million — up from \$132.1 million in the third quarter of 1971.

For the first nine months of this year, Domtar had net income of \$12.0 million, or 78 cents per common share, in comparison with \$6.0 million, or 38 cents, in the same period in 1971.

Sales and other revenues for the three quarters of this year were \$416.2 million, an increase from \$381.9 million in the first nine months of 1971.

Cash flow for the third quarter of 1972 and for the nine-month period was 83 cents and \$2.42 — up from 63 cents and \$1.80 last year.
