Delayed for Lack of Money

TRUCK ROUTES PUSHED BACK TO 1976

Halton county council approved the roads committee recommendation to improve the Fourth and Fifth Lines of Esqueping north of 22 Sideroad, and return 22 Sideroad, Esqueping township, with little comment last week.

Deputy-reeve Russell Miller of Esqueping asked whether the delay was due to lack of money.

BRIDGES FIRST
"That's right", replied deputy-reeve Don McMillan of Nassagaweya, chairman of the roads committee. He said there was nothing in the capital budget for construction until then.

He said the new truck routes planned to take the truck traffic

off 22 Sideroad and the 17 Sideroad, had to be set back because of three bridges, the Norval bridge, the Wildwood bridge, and the 9th Line bridge at Hungry Hollow.

Warden Jim Swenborough asked why the work had to be set back when bridges are 80 percent subsidized.

McMillan replied that they have to work on the totals when applying for approvals, not the

amount after subsidy is deducted.

SOME DOUBTS
McMillan expressed some doubts about the Fourth and Fifth Lines improvement as a solution to the truck traffic. "I am afraid it will haunt us for sometime", he commented.

Reeve Tom Hill pointed out the residents already knew the work would not be done till 1975. "So one year more is not so bad", he remarked.

Children's Aid Sees More Demands by Teens

The staff and board of directors of the Children's Aid Society of Halton County spent a day recently, discussing the many changing social patterns and needs within the county.

Abortions and the growing trend of unmarried mothers to keep their babies have created a shortage of newborn infants available for adoption.

HALF-WAY HOUSE
Throughout the discussion, it became increasingly evident that Halton needs more psychiatric counselling and mental health services. As well, it was indicated that a day treatment centre and a pre-school treatment centre should be available to the CAS to provide for the needs of disturbed children of all ages.

Reports were given by the Christmas card committee and the Services at Home and Abroad committee.

A 'half-way' house is required to help previously disturbed child move more comfortably into society.

The Children's Aid Society has, in the popular mind, been associated with helping families in crisis. "In terms of their present work this is largely true. Families do require immediate assistance. However, it is hoped that continued family counselling and therapy for disturbed children will see the crisis situation diminish. The emphasis of broad agency activity will shift from a crisis philosophy to a preventive one", a CAS spokesman commented.

HELP TEENS
In individual and family counselling services, the CAS has grown steadily to meet the county's requirements. Work with unmarried parents continues to demand considerable attention. However, the requests for help by teens and parents with teens are growing at a much more rapid rate.

The CAS feels that demands for their services by teens and their family units will continue to rise and see this as one of the

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
