

# Will Build Fountain in Museum Garden

by JUDITH GOEBELLE. "The Friends of the Museum" presented a gift of \$1,000 to the Halton County Museum Board, at the Board's October meeting. Acting on behalf of the Friends, Reeve Ron Harris of Milton presented two cheques to the board. One cheque, in the amount of \$450 is for the completion of the log cabin; and is the remainder of the money raised last year. The second cheque, for \$550 is for a flag-stone terrace, which will be built in front of the barn in the spring of '73. The latter sum was raised by the Friends during 1972.

The friends' gift was acknowledged by two congratulatory messages. The first, from the Secretary-Treasurer of the Board, read: "On behalf of the Halton County Museum Board, I would like to extend our gratitude to the Friends for the fine job done in raising funds for special projects at the Museum. I am sure you all realize the impact of these contributions to the growth of the Museum and that without these contributions new developments at the Museum would be limited."

The second was a copy of a motion made at the Halton County Council meeting of October 18th.

"Moved by: Reeve A. J. MacArthur resolved that the Friends of the Museum be advised that the Warden and County Council thank the Friends for their generous and hard earned contributions to the Halton County Museum. Carried."

The Friends are presently busy planning next year's summer festival. The proceeds from that venture will be used to build a fountain in the museum garden, in front of the terrace.

59 Head Average \$1,776

# McKane Herd Dispersal Sale Brings \$108,800

A. H. (Art) McKane, R.R.4, Georgetown dispersed his Emeraldale Holstein herd at the Hays Sales Arena, Oakville, on November 8 for a total of \$104,800.00. The 59 head averaged \$1,776.00 with no particularly high prices, but 52 selling at more than \$1,000 each, and 15 of these bringing more than \$2,000.

The top price of \$4,800.00 was paid by Bryan Watts, Inglewood, for five-year-old Emeraldale Tempest Anne who has produced at four years of age in 305 days 16,874 lbs. milk containing 708 lbs. fat with 4.20 percent butterfat test. She was sired by Glenuve Tempest.

Martyn Heslop, Burlington, paid the second highest price of \$4,200 for the 14-year-old Emeraldale Reflection Mina, a Very Good daughter of the Excellent and Superior Type sire Roeland Reflection Sovereign. Mina has an eleven lactation lifetime total production of 179,078 lbs. milk containing 7,326 lbs. fat with an average test of 4.09 percent butterfat.

Thirty-two milking females averaged \$1,811; 11 bred heifers averaged \$1,682; eight open heifers \$987.50; nine heifer calves \$1,437.50, and six babies \$1,458.00.

Two four-year-old cows, both classified Very Good, were purchased by Priegola, Spain, at \$3,800.00 each. Alimport, Havana, Cuba, paid \$3,100.00 for an August heifer calf sired by Rosafe Citation R., and bought three open heifers at \$1,900; \$1,500; and \$1,450.00.

Frank Whaley, Hamilton, bought a five-year-old daughter of the Extra sire Dividend Clipper at \$3,550.00 and paid \$1,200.00 for her September heifer calf, Hays Farms Invertonal, Oakville, paid \$3,200, for a three-year-old cow which in her first lactation in 305 days made 9,818 lbs. milk containing 460 lbs. fat with a butterfat test of 4.69 percent. She will be shipped to Brazil.

Trayesia, Spain, purchased 11 head, their highest price being \$2,500.00 for an 11 month old daughter of Rosafe Citation

R. They also paid \$2,000. for a bred heifer, R. Dalla Favera, Italy, bought seven head including a young cow at \$2,000, and an August heifer at \$1,250.00.

TWO TO ENGLAND Murray McKane, Georgetown, bought eleven milking cows and one bred heifer, the latter at \$1,500. He paid \$1,500 for one cow and \$1,400 for another, and bought two at \$2,000 each.

Canimpex Livestock Ltd., Georgetown, paid \$2,100 for a bred heifer. Tony Drake, Hampshire, England, purchased two milking cows at \$1,800.00 and \$1,400.00. Howard Laidlaw, Brampton paid \$2,100.00 for a milking female and Bruce Watts, Inglewood paid \$2,300.00 for a bred heifer.
