

Dear Sir: Recently we have had some inquiries from interested people regarding information on Infectious Hepatitis.

We are enclosing a short article on the subject which will inform the public of basic information about this disease and trust you will find available space to publish it in your newspaper. Hepatitis means flamation of the liver."

Infectious Hepatitis is caused by a virus passed from one person to another. It is transmitted, most commonly by hands, from the stools of the infected patient to the gastrointestinal tract of a well


