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RECREATION IS MAIN ITEM

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She is critical of raising recreation money from a lot levy on new construction introduced this year and would fight to repeal this. She compared recreation facilities today with those when she came to town. "No theatre, no Rose Room, now," she said. "The same arena and swimming pool. There's nothing for our young people."

Fred Harrison, Ward 1 candidate, said he started in 1958 to do something for Georgetown, with participation in minor hockey.

"And I don't intend to stop, elected or not," he said.

He said council had erred in a situation where the Canadian Legion pulled out of sponsorship of Saturday morning hockey, and in its handling of the fire department this year. He criticized a by-law which keeps people in the Ann Street area from making improvements to their homes.

He would improve a dangerous intersection at Mountainview and River Drive, and wants sidewalks for this busy area.

Ernest Hyde, seeking reelection as a Ward 1 councillor, said that while many candidates are promising a recreation complex, which may be desirable and an eventual goal.

"But to support this at present shows a lack of forethought and planning," he said. "There is the question of traffic and parking. I suggest recreation facilities should be spread throughout town."

He said the Recreation Committee has investigated a swimming pool which the town could construct at the high school, as has been done in Burlington, and that it can be done without a capital cost which would be a burden to taxpayers.

In a question period, he said the town needs all types of residential development, including apartments... "but I wouldn't want Georgetown's skyline to look like Brampton's."

We have enough service clubs that, if they put their heads together, they could raise more than a million dollars, he said.

He said council should come up with a much better plan for the older part of Georgetown than it has in the proposed zoning by-law.

"Let's scrap this, which tells us where we are going to put high rises," he said.

"I'm against all real estate men running for council," he added.

Answering a question, he said it is time road and sidewalk work is done in the older sections of his ward, like Normandy, Byron, Shelley and Prince Charles.

Wm. F. Hunter, a former town reeve and county warden, is seeking office in Ward 2.

He was a member of council which introduced a subdivision control by-law which set fees for developers, he said.

He would reconstruct the remaining unimproved highway strip through town, favours a second arena and swimming pool, if finances are available, and would enlarge the sewage disposal plant.

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CONTEST IN WARD 2
Like Ward 1, there are six aspirants for the two Ward 2 council seats.

Michael Armstrong said he has no criticism of the present council, and congratulated them for their efforts.

"I make no pre-election promises which could come back to haunt me later," he said. "I would like an opportunity to serve my ward and my town."

He is concerned with roads, recreation and sewage extension, but realizes things must be looked at in proper perspective, he said.

Questioned on industrial-commercial ratio, he is a 60-40 believer, he said.

"I spend most of my money driving into Toronto for recreation and entertainment," said candidate Tony Corbett, who said one of his biggest aims is a new arena.

"Four years ago I proposed to the Recreation Committee a plan to raise funds for this and council said it was not in position to endorse a campaign then. Four years later, I'm still waiting," he said.

He said there is dire need for communication between council, committees and taxpayers.

When he answered a ratepayer's question about cost with a million dollars, the questioner said a new Aurora arena alone had cost more than that.

Mr. Corbett said that Bramalea had raised \$20,000 towards their recreation complex in one day.

A former councillor, John Hole is a Ward 2 candidate, and also runs in favour of a sports arena.

Campsite in Esquesing For Bruce Trail Hikers

Bruce Trail enthusiasts have the opportunity to enjoy the facilities of a campsite in Esquesing with the completion of one at 22 Sideroad and Fourth Line, on land owned by the Indusmin Quarry people.

Last summer the erection of a shelter on the Bill Cox farm on the Nassagaweya-Esquesing Town Line was the first, on land owned by Consolidated Sand and Gravel Co.

Both the campsite and the shelter are connected to the main trail by blue-blazed side trails.

The Bruce Trail "Footnotes" says that there has been some trouble resulting from the use of the Trail by school groups,

involving garbage and vandalism. It can be blamed upon inadequate supervision. Footnotes claims, "We recommend that parties on the Trail should include one adult for every five children. The vandalism incident was particularly troublesome, resulting in our having to close a section of the trail and reroute."

Footnotes also reports that the Guelph-Acton Radial Trail has achieved a hook-up with the Toronto section of the Bruce Trail.

Walkers on either trail can just follow the blazes.

Separate School Board Will Sponsor Teachers For Family Life Course

The Education Committee of the Halton County Separate School Board has recommended that the board sponsor up to 15 teachers for the Family Life Course to be held at St. Jerome's College in Waterloo during the summer of 1973.

Education Committee chairman Don Hill advised the trustees that the summer program will be limited to 250 applicants. Trustees were briefed on the role of the board's present six Family Life resource teachers and an outline of the duties of Family Life resource teachers is to be forwarded to each trustee.

If 15 teachers complete the course next summer at Waterloo, there will then be one Family Life resource teacher for each of the Halton County Separate Schools.

Family Life resource teachers work under the direction of the Family Life Consultants and the school principal toward the implementation and integration of the Family Life program within the school to which they are assigned.
