

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# Trappers Are Again Working Their Lines

working their trap lines in the this. far north and elsewhere. BEAVER

Beaver will provide most of the fur that will account for the trappers income. The size of the trapping area, will regulate the different quotas each trapper is allowed for the different fur bearing animals.

Some trappers are allowed a quota of 90 beaver, and some others are allowed less. Beaver pelts sell at North Bay for as little as \$8.00 and as much as \$45.00 or \$50.00.

The best pelts are taken usually in January when the ponds are frozen over and covered with snow.

The pelts are darker then. previous to this the animals are subject to too much light which causes the fur to have a light reddish sheen to it. FISHER

The fisher is another animal that provides a good price at the sales. It is an animal that resembles a large weasel, the males are usually dark, almost black, the females are smaller but the fur is lighter and very fine, a good female pelt will bring perhaps \$45.00, and a male \$20 or \$22.00.

The fisher is known to be the fastest animal in the tree tops, a marten will overtake a red squirrel in the tree tops, but a fisher will catch a marten.

PICKSON PORKY
Its chief food is the porcupine which the fisher rolls over to rip open the stomach

Nature provided the fisher with special skin layers, that porcupine quills can't penetrate, instead they flatten out and come back out.

Of course there have been times apparently when the fisher has received the worst of it, and have been found dead from starvation due to quills in

• the mouth and head. SECOND IN COURAGE I rate the fisher next in line to

the wolverine for courage. The wolverine, unlike the fisher, usually gets the worst of it when it tackles a porcupine, due to the clumsy way it goes about it. Wolverines have been found dead with quills in mouth and throat, also in stomach walls and in body cavity

FISHING RODS Don't store fishing rods for winter that are still put together. Take them apart and the furrells. Clean the female furrell out with varsol.

A new fly pattern is born every minute. This one is the redbadger hair wing. limerick hook, down eye, tail bright red hair or hackle fibers, (long), medium flat gold tinsel

Dressing No. 6 or 7, 7x long rib over red seal fur body that was soun on thread.

TRY THIS ONE Head black.




