Last Wednesday, Dec. 6, George Archibald and I were honoured to attend the Ontario Sport Achievement Awards Banquet. We represented the 1971 Georgetown Junior Boys Team that won the Y.B.C. National Championship that year.

The banquet was held in the main dining room of the Macdonald Block at Queen's Park.

A total of about 320 Ontario amateur athletes, coaches and officials attended representing about 900 individuals or team members who won national or international championships in 1971. All 900 have been presented or mailed an Achievement Award on behalf of the Government of the Province of Ontario.

As you will recall, Georgetown's Junior Boys Team, made up of Dave Warman, Stephen Foster, Steven Burns, Rick Gourlie and Chris Burke, travelled to Burnaby, B.C. in April of 1971, representing Southern Ontario at the annual event and defeated the second place Manitoba team by about 500 pins (or 15 Peterson points).

Among those to whom Premier William Davis presented this award were Foster Hewitt (hockey broadcaster) and John Martin, who is a founder of the Youth Bowling Council and organizer of Canada's largest bowling tournament, the "O'Connor Open".

Also at the banquet were Brenda Crump (Senior Y.B.C. Singles Champion), Larry Pearson and Beverly Bentley (Coach and Team Rep. of Senior Girls Team Champions) who we first met in British Columbia in 1971.

# Trappers Are Again Working Their Lines

Trappers are once again working their trap lines in the far north and elsewhere.

**BEAVER**  
Beaver will provide most of the fur that will account for the trappers income. The size of the trapping area, will regulate the different quotas each trapper is allowed for the different fur-bearing animals.

Some trappers are allowed a quota of 90 beaver, and some others are allowed less. Beaver pelts sell at North Bay for as little as \$8.00 and as much as \$15.00 or \$50.00.

The best pelts are taken usually in January when the ponds are frozen over and covered with snow.

The pelts are darker then. Previous to this the animals are subject to too much light which causes the fur to have a light reddish sheen to it.

**FISHER**  
The fisher is another animal that provides a good price at the sales. It is an animal that resembles a large weasel, the males are usually dark, almost black, the females are smaller but the fur is lighter and very fine, a good female pelt will bring perhaps \$45.00, and a male \$30 or \$22.00.

The fisher is known to be the fastest animal in the tree tops, a marten will overtake a red squirrel in the tree tops, but a fisher will catch a marten.

**PICKS ON PORKY**  
Its chief food is the porcupine which the fisher rolls over to rip open the stomach area.

Nature provided the fisher with special skin layers, that porcupine quills can't penetrate, instead they flatten out and come back out.

Of course there have been times apparently when the fisher has received the worst of it, and have been found dead from starvation due to quills in the mouth and head.

**SECOND IN COURAGE**  
I rate the fisher next in line to the wolverine for courage.

A baby's ear swab is good for this.

**TRY THIS ONE**  
A new fly pattern is born every minute. This one is the redbadger hair wing. Dressing No. 6 or 7, 7x long limerick hook, down eye, tail bright red hair or hackle fibers (long), medium flat gold tinsel rib over red seal fur body that was spun on thread.

Wing badger hair, jungle cock eye for each cheek and grizzle collar, hackle in front. Head black.

Try it, you will like it. This has to be all for this week. So a very merry Christmas and a pleasant 1973 New Year.
