

Neil Korzack Tours Poland With U. of T. Hockey Blues

Junior A ranks with Peterboro last season, is a first year Science student at the U of T. "A decision was made sometime ago that we were going to Poland, but for awhile it looked as if the trip was off."

said Blues' head coach Tom Watt. "It wasn't until last Tuesday night that we managed to clear a few of the obstacles preventing us from going."
"We couldn't get our visas from the Polish Embassy in Ottawa until we had approval from the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, the International Ice Hockey Federation and the Polish Amateur Hockey Federation. We found out Tuesday that the visas will be waiting for us at the KLM Airlines office in Montreal."

The Blues, Canadian Inter-collegiate Athletic Union defending champions, left Thursday for Warsaw to begin the two week trip. They travelled by bus from Warsaw to Katowice, where they'll play all their games.

The Blues sent 20 players, Watt, a manager and Ziggy Woch, a former Polish Olympic gymnast and staff member at the University of Toronto.
"Woch will act as our interpreter and chef de mission", Watt said. "He was mainly responsible for organizing the trip."

PLAYERS PAY

The trip will cost about \$6,000 and the players will pay \$1,000, with the remainder of the money coming from the University of Toronto's Varsity Fund and donations. The Polish teams will pay hotel and food expenses.

"We don't know how any of their teams play but we know they have some good teams since they made the A Group of the World Amateur Hockey championships", Watt said. "There were some university teams from Sweden and Czechoslovakia playing there recently and we hope we can get some games with them as well."

OSL Warns Snowmobilers This is Danger Period

Snowmobilers are warned by the Ontario Safety League that travel on ice-covered surfaces of lakes and rivers can be hazardous particularly at this time of year.

unless they have intimate knowledge of the current conditions and ice in all areas. Drivers who are unfamiliar with an area should contact members of the local snowmobile club or other local authorities.

This is "freeze-up" time when snow-covered ice surfaces seldom give any indication of the danger of thin ice until it is too late.

The greatest single cause of snowmobile fatalities is collisions with motor vehicles. Ernest Taylor of the Ontario Safety League advises snowmobilers not to travel on public thoroughfares.

Rivers and river mouths are described as the most treacherous areas as the current of the water under the ice wears away the underside of the ice and prevents the water from freezing to a uniform thickness.

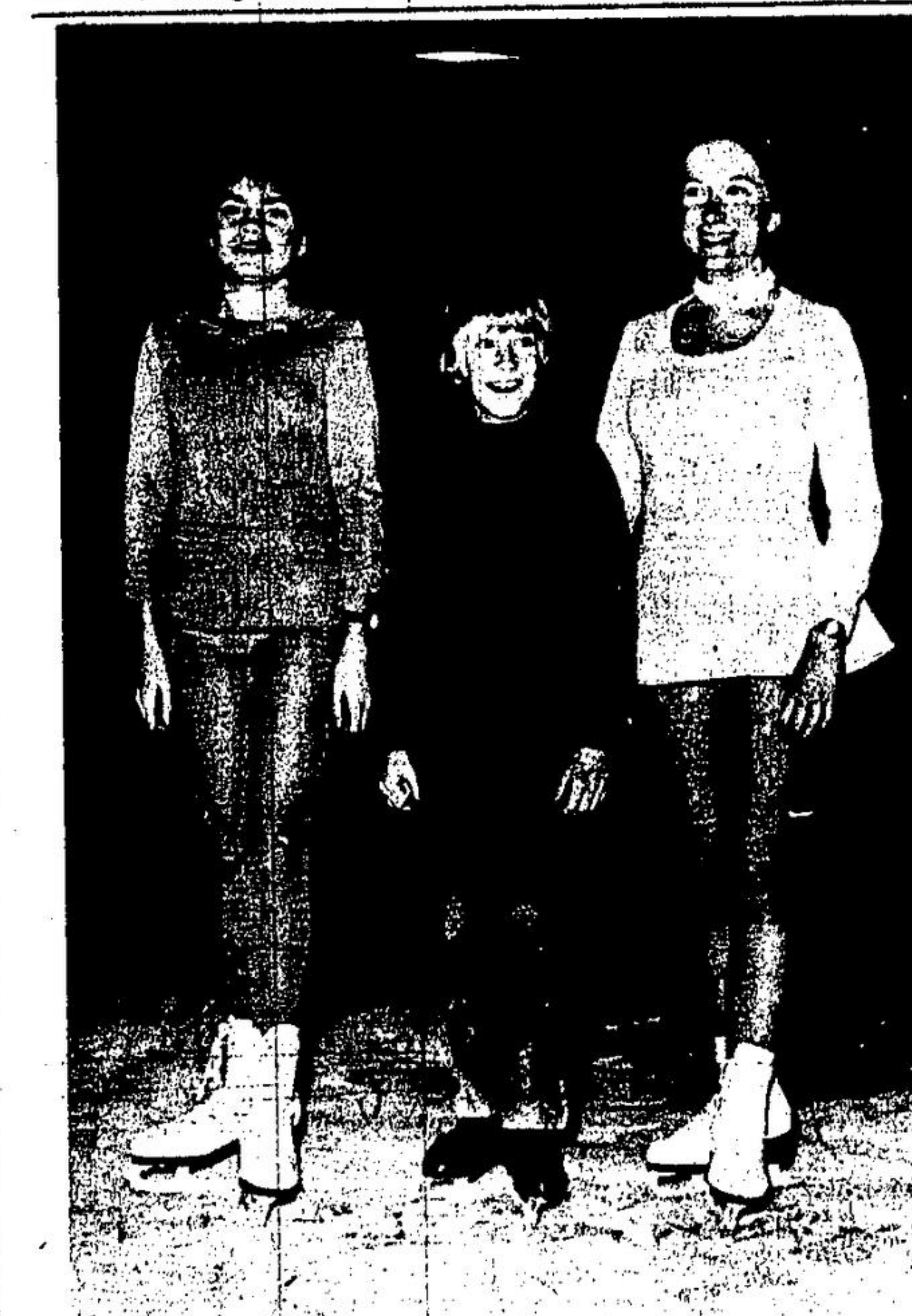
