

# Somebody Lopped 15 Feet Off Cemetery's Big Spruce

Members of the Hillcrest Cemetery Board and many citizens of the Norval district are shocked to learn that some very thoughtless person helped himself to the top of a beautiful 35 foot blue spruce tree just inside the gates of the cemetery to use as a Christmas tree. A ladder and truck were required to steal the top 15 feet of the tree valued at at least \$1000.

It is estimated that it has taken 30 to 35 years to grow this large blue spruce which added much to the beauty of the cemetery. "Poems are made by fools like me, but only God can grow a tree".

It is quite common to hear about people losing a tree from their front lawn or from their landscaping to the Christmas tree thief but it must have been an exceptionally thoughtless person who would steal from a cemetery.

Also of concern to many citizens is the fact that snowmobilers are using the cemetery as a snowmobile run. It appears that no place is sacred anymore. Norval district citizens are very proud of the beautiful peaceful, hill top cemetery and the Hillcrest Cemetery Board have worked hard over the years to maintain and add to the beauty of the grounds. It is the last place one would expect to find a Christmas tree thief or snowmobilers out for their fun.
