

Four Third Period Goals Give Raiders Slim Victory

Georgetown raiders are currently knotted with Welland Merchants on the fourth rung of the Niagara District Intermediate A Hockey League ladder, but they don't intend to stay there.

In a concerted effort to secure a playoff berth and

maybe even reach the higher regions of the OHA's only Intermediate A league, Raiders have snared four players freed by the disbanded Oakville Senior A Oaks and talked their former ace forward Blake Inglis out of retirement. On top of those pluses add Terry Holmes, a member of last year's Ontario champions who dropped out of hockey this season, but showed up on skates in red and white garb at the Raiders' practice Monday night.

The ex-Oaks who have quickly become Raiders are Craig Brush, Jeff Nicholson, Ivan Fournier and Ron McNeil. Brush, Nicholson, Fournier and Blake Inglis were in the Raider line-up Friday when they wrestled an 8-6 victory from last place Fort Erie. Brush contributed a pair of goals, Nicholson also scored and picked up two assists, while Fournier and Inglis each assisted twice.

However, despite the injection of new talent, it was Ray Evans who paced the attack with three goals. Paul Robinson notched Raiders' other goal. Hal Maracle and Gerry Russell scored two apiece, and Rich Will and Harry Bremner one each for Fort Erie.

Georgetown had to come from behind to gain the win. They took a 4-1 lead into the second period but Fort Erie shooters turned the tables with five unanswered goals in the middle frame. Raiders almost duplicated the trick with four unanswered scored in the final period.

Second place Port Colborne provide the Raiders with their next test tomorrow night in the Memorial Arena.
