he could not support Mrs. McArthur initially, but would if she were elected.  
In a show of unanimity, Reeve Morrow asked for an unanimous vote for Mrs. McArthur following the 8 to 6 vote. He was seconded by Reeve Mason.  
**PRAYER RETURNS**  
In her inaugural address Warden McArthur asked for a return of the Lord's Prayer to the opening exercises of Halton County Council.  
She asked that respect for the country and the Creator should be shown this way. She pointed out that flags had been placed on the podium for the first time. The practice of opening with the Lord's prayer was abandoned last year by past warden James Swanborough.  
"The Know your County" week started by Swanborough, and said she would carry it on but add a cultural aspect. She urged a prize for the best oil painting of a landscape of Halton, with the county buying it and hanging it in the county building.  
Among the guests in the crowded gallery were six past wardens Jack Milne, Herbert Hinton, Dr. Frank Oakes, Gordon Gallagher, W. F. Hunter, and immediate past warden James Swanborough. Warden Anne McArthur is the second woman warden of Halton court. Mary Petit was the first in 1949.

**Hydro Hopes to  
Start Tower Trail  
This Coming Fall**  
While the second phase of inquiry into a planned 500 KV power line between Nanticoke and Pickering continues at a deliberate pace, Ontario Hydro has begun work on a 230 KV line from Middleport to Toronto to prevent possible power shortages.  
Ken McClymont, of Hydro's systems planning department, told a hearing conducted at Queen's Park Thursday that the new line would serve only as a temporary measure "caused by the delay".  
He added that Hydro is still hopeful of commencing the acquisition of land and installation of towers by this September. He said work on the project would have to begin by then to avoid blackouts in Metro Toronto and surrounding area.  
Thursday's meeting was the second conducted by study consultant Bruce Howlett. He was recommended by Dr. Omond Solandt in his interim report to the Ontario government three months ago.  
Mr. Howlett says he will probably make his submission to Dr. Solandt by "early summer" and then further public meetings will be conducted by the Commission.  
**NO TIME LIMIT**  
Neil Cole, the commission secretary, said, "There is no time limit set on the study. If there was an area that required additional study, the time would be available".  
Mr. Howlett spent most of Thursday's session outlining plans for a series of public meetings to be held in various communities.  
Named as likely sites were Brampton, Waterdown, Richmond Hill, and Stouffville. The meetings will probably begin in late February and be conducted on a weekly basis with four or five sessions at each locale.

**Delicate Balance  
Festival Entry**  
Rehearsals are now under way for Georgetown Little Theatre group's latest production, "A Delicate Balance". This play has been chosen as the entry in the Central Ontario Drama League's competition among amateur theatre groups.  
They will compete with 18 groups from the Toronto area in the hopes of becoming one of the five finalists and then the regional champions. They would then move into the national competition in St. Catharines during the month of May.  
"A Delicate Balance" was written by Edward Albee. Not unlike another successful play of his "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf", the audience is left with many social questions at intermission and after the show.  
The director of the Georgetown Little Theatre Group recommends the play for mature audiences. It is his view that perhaps the younger players might find the play a little heavy for their taste.
