Expect Start Dam in '74

SNELGROVE—Construction of a Snelgrove dam will begin early in 1974 it was disclosed at Chinguacousy council meeting by engineer Dick Stolz. Metro Toronto and Region Conservation Authority expects to go to tender this year and start construction in early 1974. The dam's probable location is near 15 Sideroad just south of Snelgrove, east of Highway 10. Another location being considered is farther north in the same concession. A spokesman for the conservation authority said the recreational use at the dam would be of a passive nature.

False Fire Calls Alarming

ACTON—Police and firefighters are expressing concern over a rash of false alarms - six in the span of one week. The alarms summoned firemen to Home Hardware, and Cedar Spring Motel among other locations. In most cases the dispatcher double checked with a phone call and discovered the alarms were false before sounding the siren. Bell Telephone has investigating personnel who will be brought in if the prank calls continue.

Barber-Greene Makes Move

MILTON—Barber-Greene Canada Ltd. has moved both its manufacturing and office facilities from Don Mills to its new plant in Milton. Included in the move is the firm's Ontario branch office which is responsible for sales, service and parts for the full line of Barber-Greene construction and industrial equipment in the province. The Milton location was selected after a study of some 150 possible locations over a three year period.
