## First Round Tourney Schedule

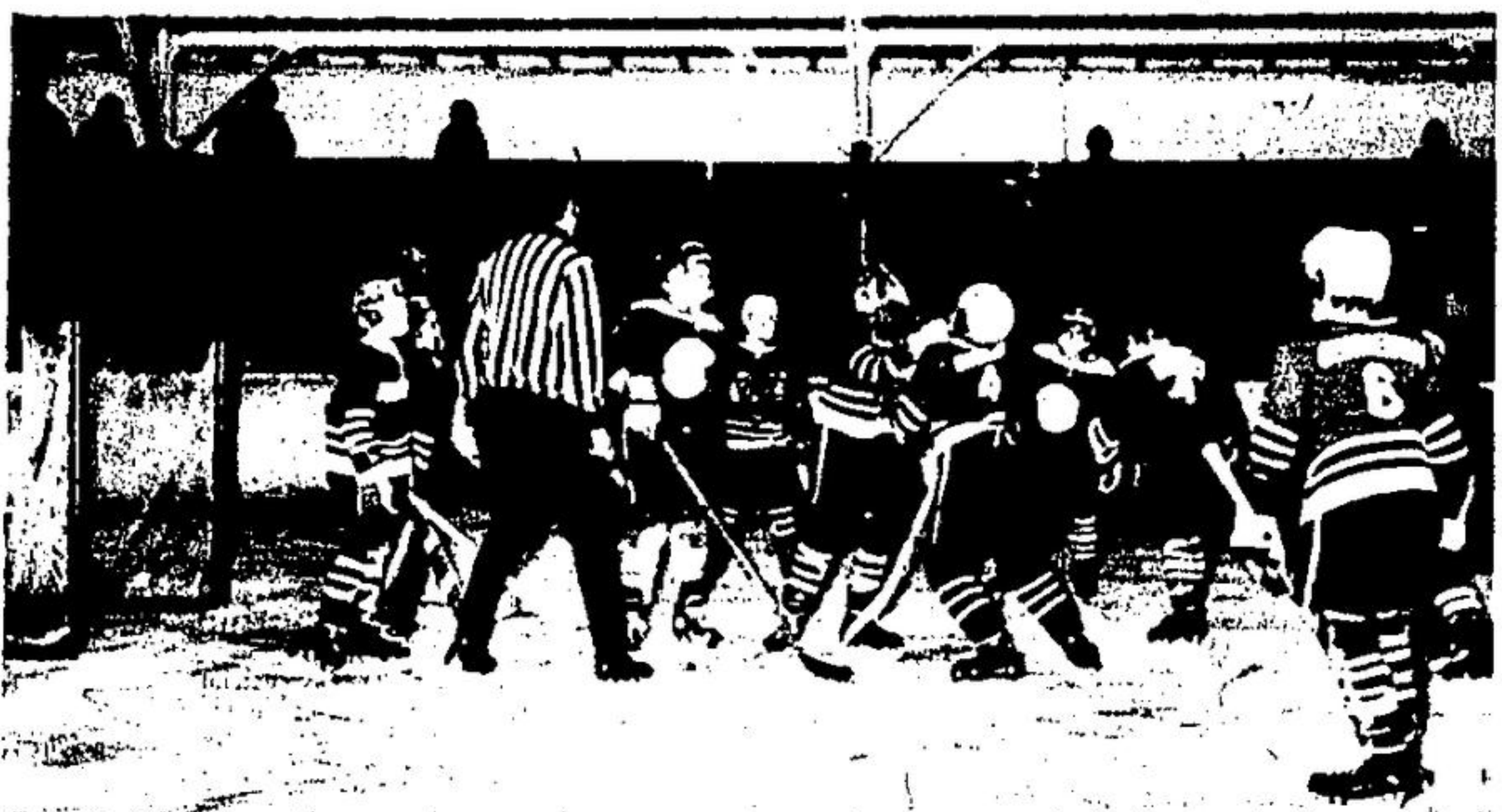

## Deputy Reeve Len Cox Explains By-Law

Deputy Reeve Len Cox explained the by-law forbids any more trailers in the township. He said the trailers licensed in Willow Park are licensed only in Willow Park.

Martin protested that this gives the owner of Willow Park a monopoly. "I have \$10,000 invested in the mobile home and nowhere to put it", he contended.

Cr. George Maltby said the by-law excludes the trailers in that park from the right to be moved from one spot in the township to another.

### NO MORE

Cr. Dick Howitt explained that the 1967 by-law states there will be no more trailers in the township, except the 14 allowed in Willow Park. Trailers already in the township at that time can stay. "So Willow Park is the only park in the township where year round trailers can park?" commented Martin. "That's the way the by-law reads and that's what we have to go by", said the reeve.
