CLERGY COMMENT

I Never Cease to Wonder

This week I had the joy of baptizing a baby. Yesterday, I had the sorrow of officiating at the funeral of a very good friend. And this weekend I shall be taking part in celebrations dedicated to the immortal memory of the greatest Scottish poet Robert Burns, whose birthday, January 25, is celebrated by Scots all over the world.

In a way the week will have been a summary of life, for I have been brought into contact with three of life's greatest realities, birth, death and remembrance.

The baptism that reminds us of birth. I never cease to wonder when I hold a baby in my arms. There lightly resting is an amazing bundle of possibilities for good or evil. The challenge is that the realization of these possibilities lies almost entirely in the hands of the parents.

Everyone that comes into the world is part of God's vision for the world. For every person entering the world by the door of birth, God has a plan and purpose, and it depends almost entirely on the training, teaching and example of the parents, as to whether the child will achieve what God wills for him.

The funeral that reminds us of death. Langfellow wrote:

There is a Reaper, whose name is Death And, with his sickle keen, He reaps the bearded grain at a breath And the flowers that grow between.

Here is an assault against which we have no defence, an end that we can never escape.

There is nothing here for complaint or regret or fear, for this is an essential part of the contract into which we entered when we became human. Again the challenge faces us, the challenge to be ready to meet death when he comes, at morning, noon, or night.

The Burns Supper that reminds us of memory. One of the questions that we all ask of ourselves at some time is, "Will I be remembered when I'm gone?" with its corollary, "By what will I be remembered when I'm gone?"

When a man dies and others speak about him, again and again someone will sum up his life and achievements in one sentence, for every man leaves behind him some dominant impression of himself. Here again is the challenge, so to live that men will remember our lives with pleasure when our presence is no longer amongst them.

May we so live that the memory we leave is a fragrant and abiding possession.

Dynamo Ruins on Historical List

Twenty-four members of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority are now scouting for historical sites in the area.

A list will then be forwarded to the Minister of Natural Resources who is requesting such information from all municipalities in Ontario.

It is a project to identify all significant sites to assess recreation and tourism resources, historical buildings, ruins and physical landscapes.

Some of the sites that will appear on the list are an eight sided barn at Caledon, the last of a type used many years ago, and producing paper from flux.

The only site listed in Georgetown is a dynamo in ruins located across from the Graham Bell plant on Armstrong Avenue. It was the first place in the world to transfer electrical power from its primary source for industrial purposes. It was originally the power source for the Barber Brothers' Woollen Mill, which later became a paper mill producing paper from flux.

Teachers Banned From Boards (Continued from Page 1) working conditions, only salaries, and as a result Halton County has the highest student teacher ratio in the province; a record the board is proud of," Barrett said. He says it's important to the quality of education to keep the classes at their present size and deal with the rising student population by employing more teachers. "The board also gets rid of experienced teachers because their wages become too high and hire rookies fresh out of school. The schools need these experienced teachers," he claimed. "Teachers do not have the right to strike, work to rule and resignation are their only alternatives, and this is another example of how the O.S.T.F. is not a union," said Barrett. "The reason the present board representatives want teachers banned from the board is that they are their strongest opposition during elections," said Barrett. "The electorate should have the right to make the choice." Mr. Barrett said he will attend the board meeting tonight but only to observe and take notes. If there is a decision in favour of a motion to ban teachers from the board, to be sent to the provincial government, Mr. Barrett said he will express his concern after the meeting. "To oppose the motion at the meeting would not help the image or the cause at this stage," he said. He has not made a request to speak at the meeting which has to be made seven days in advance.
