Last Thursday evening at the North Halton Golf and Country Club, an official body of O.P.F. members presented the Royal Canadian Humane Association Medal for Bravery to Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Cree of 14 Mary St. May 7, 1972, a couple in their fifties were east bound on the 401, when their car hit a guide rail, a cement culvert, then while airborne hit a bridge. Hugh and Susan Cree, coming from a party, saw the car which was starting to burn. Mr. Cree

pulled over and ran to see if anyone was inside. He and his wife then pulled the victims from the car saving them from the flames and explosion which followed. Constable Wayne Renwick of the Port Credit OPP detachment, the officer covering the accident attended the honouring dinner and expressed his appreciation to Mr. and Mrs. Cree for their actions May 7. Adam of District 5 headquarters. Downsview Toronto made the presentation of the bronze medal following dinner. Mr. Cree reiterated the fact that they hadn't expected a reward of any kind.

# 1972 Fall Fair Shows Deficit, Directors Told At Annual Meeting

Due to the early morning rain and higher programming expenses, the Georgetown Agricultural Society sponsoring the fall fair ended their year with a deficit of \$1960.52. The largest item contributing to the deficit was the loss of some \$1200.00 on gate receipts. This plus a \$600.00 jump in the cost of trophies and ribbons and an increase in operational expenses, rather stunned the directors who had previously enjoyed small surpluses. Total receipts were \$9,404 and total expenditures \$11,365.10.

The annual meeting was held in the Master Feeds Research building and was preceded by a pot luck supper. President Spencer Wilson was in the chair. Henry Stanley, Halton Ag-Rep, was present and urged the directors to get behind the 1974 International Plowing Match which will be held in the Georgetown district. He hoped many would enter the Home Improvement Assoc. contest. Mr. Stanley also presided for the election of officers, and made the presentation of the Eaton silver tray for the most points in the dairy cattle classes at the fair to John McNabb of R.R. 2 on his Guernseys.

Albert Hunter, of R.R. 2 Norval was elected president for 1973; Robert McMaster, 1st vice-president; Ralph Cunningham, 2nd vice-president and Sam Penrice, 3rd vice-president. Mrs. Ken Milne and Mrs. George Ironside were selected secretary and treasurer.

Council approved a grant of \$300 to the Halton County Farmstead and Rural Home Improvement Competition. Council agreed to hire a part time office assistant at \$2.50 an hour until the clerical assistant can resume full time duties.

Council authorized the road superintendent to sign plans allowing the Bell Telephone Co. to place two buried cables along the south and west sides of Highway 7, west from Georgetown to Acton.
