Improvements to the John Street bridge have been delayed, because Credit Valley Conservation Authority has declined to endorse the proposal.

Last year, Georgetown council approved an estimated \$6,000 expenditure to repair the

The plan would have reduced the size of the culvert under the bridge by half.

But the Conservation Authority is insisting that the same size culvert remain.

Town Engineer Eric Willis told council's works committee Monday that the half-size culvert should be satisfactory. It is the same size as one fur ther downstream, which channels the same stream under Maple Avenue, near the waterworks building.

NO TROUBLE "It seems strange", he told the committee "that they can dictate culvert size, but cannot give statistics on water flow" Cr. Ern Hyde said that during Hurricane Hazel, which accounted for the largest water flow in history, no trouble was experienced with the Maple Avenue culvert.
