At Annual Church Meeting

New and remodelled facilities at St. George's Anglican Church were discussed when the annual vestry meeting was held Sunday evening.

Those attending endorsed a plan to establish a building committee, which will draw up plans for improvements and submit them to a meeting of parishoners later this year.

Church warden William McNally mentioned the need, particularly for a church office in the building, perhaps a better access to the church entrance, creation of one or two meeting rooms, increased accommodation for church school and kitchen improvements.

At his suggestion, a ceiling of \$65,000 was put on plans.

The church added \$8,000 to its building fund in 1972, and now has over \$11,000 earmarked for improvements.

Inconsiderate Driver Left Injured Dog to Die

To the editor: I feel certain that the motorist who struck down a medium sized black dog, with white markings in the vicinity of Georgetown Market Plaza somewhere between 8:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. on Sunday, Jan. 14 must have wondered on at least one occasion, about her demise.

Gabby fell instantly, her muscles and limbs totally paralysed from the middle of her back, down. Only her front legs and head could respond to her futile efforts to regain her feet, so she lay as she had fallen, until she was found by a weekend driver of the Oakville Humane Society.

At that time, 1:00 p.m., she was taken to the nearby animal clinic for x-rays and medical attention. Gabby's paralysis

remained unchanged up to Wednesday morning, despite treatment and consistent administration of tranquilizers, when other symptoms appeared and indicated other internal complications.

The decision was made and she was put out of her misery.

Well, Mr. Motorist, you know now what followed your apathy. And since you know what time she was picked up, you and you alone, know how long she lay in her helpless state.

Striking her was not the fault, but leaving her where she lay was despicable.

My sincere thanks to the Oakville Humane Society driver, whose name I am unable to obtain, for making up in no small measure for the callousness of many of us, and to Dr. McEwan, who kept us informed throughout with candid appraisals.
