

# List Dragway Violations

## Don't Ease Regulations Urge North Esquensing Ratepayers

An easing of regulations governing Toronto International Dragway are violently opposed by the North Esquensing Ratepayers Association, according to a letter from Ellis Taylor, a member of the executive, received by Esquensing council Monday night.

Taylor said the result of the changes requested by the Dragway would be seven days a week racing. Earlier gate openings on Sunday is an attempt to place the onus of traffic congestion somewhere other than the Dragway, said Ellis Taylor.

He claimed that development of the Dragway into a big-time operation would lessen the opportunity for local enthusiasts to participate. He urged council to allow no further expansion or development of the project.

**HAVE TO ACCEPT**

The letter concluded by restating the Association's position that the Dragway should never have been allowed to operate in the first place. "We have had to accept this operation, and the decision of council as it was evident that it might have placed the council in an uneconomical legal position, win or lose, if they had

refused a permit for racing," the letter stated.

A long list of alleged violations of the by-law was attached to the letter, among them were the landings and take offs of a private plane.

Murray Coles, a member of the North Esquensing Ratepayers' Association asked if others could come to the committee meeting with the Dragway solicitors.

**GOAT IT**

Reeve Tom Hill said the president Dennis Denny, and the nearest neighbour Peter Bowman had been invited.

When Coles said Denny could not come, the Reeve said he could appoint someone else. He then, relaxing his stand said, "Come if you want, we'll sit back and let the two groups go at it."

The Reeve asked what he thought council could do about a plane landing "as far as I know a man who owns a plane can land it on his own property and this man is part owner of the Dragway."

"Just as long as it doesn't become an airstrip," replied Coles.

The Reeve replied they had enough trouble now, without allowing an airstrip.

## NORTH HALTON REPORT

## Endorse \$500 Plus To Buy Wiring

Opinion differed at a council works committee meeting Monday, about a proposed \$500 charge for underground wiring in new subdivisions.

Georgetown Hydro Commission has asked council to endorse a plan, where there would be a \$500 minimum charge per single family dwelling, plus an extra charge should costs exceed this figure.

The subdivision would have to foot the bill where wiring runs past schools, parks and shopping plazas.
