Tells History of Cotton to W.I.

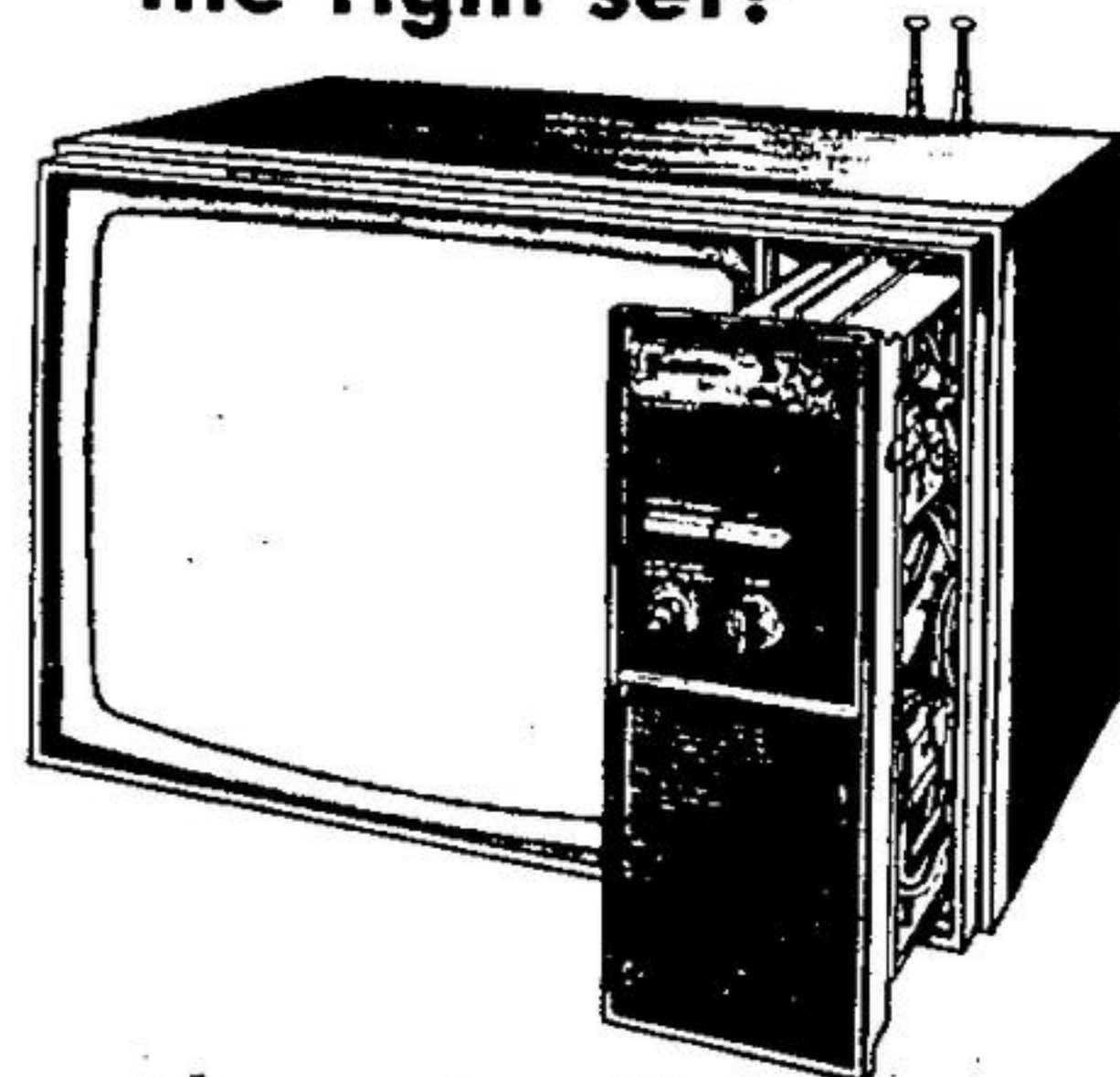
