Lake Nipissing is producing some nice whitefish. They are a good size and quite firm.

It's always best to fillet them and remove the bones, then sever the coarse skin from the meat. This of course eliminates the messy scaling job. They are delicious when dipped in egg batter and treated with fine cracker crumbs.

Then of course it's best to use Mazolla oil or corn oil to fry them in. A dash of grapefruit juice or lemon juice adds to the flavour.

1972 ARCHERY SEASON
The month long season last fall for archers, resulted in a hunter success ratio of about four percent which is considered average for bowmen. An estimated 5,000 deer range in the bow season areas, which include the regional municipality of Niagara, and the counties of Elgin, Middlesex, Haldimand, Kent, Essex, Norfolk and Lambton. Indications are the season for this year will be longer and the hunting range extended.

ONE FOR THE RECORD BOOK

A cow moose with four calves was spotted in Ontario prior to the 1972 moose hunting season about 100 miles northeast of Thunder Bay. At last report the apparently healthy calves and their mother were living in the heart of a province wide wilderness that boasts a moose herd estimated at 150,000.

Single calves and twins are common but Ontario Natural Resources officials believe the quadruplets may have set a new world record for moose.
