

Martel Unveils Library Addition for Councillors

Plans for the proposed addition to the Georgetown Public Library, unveiled by architect Paul Martel, for the first time to members of council, Thursday night, were well received by the councillors present.

Mayor Bill Smith said he was delighted with the plans, and others echoed his sentiments. Council will now consider the plan in detail and turn it over to the planning board, for their recommendation. The estimated cost of \$205,000 was not discussed at this stage, but will come in for much discussion at later meetings.

Paul Martel told council the 6,000 sq. ft. extension would wrap around the end of the existing building closest to Knox church, and would preserve every stained glass window.

PRESERVES CHARACTER
He said he was primarily concerned with preserving the existing character of the building, yet giving more space. The addition would be two storeys with a gallery overlooking the present library.

A street level access would be provided to adult areas to make it easier for elderly and disabled persons and a separate entrance to the junior library would keep junior traffic to that area. An outside patio off the junior library is proposed for story hours in good weather. The sloping grassy area around the patio would provide a natural small amphitheatre for seating.

MULTI PURPOSE
A multi purpose room for puppet shows, film shows, or for community meetings, could be shut off from the rest of the library and used anytime, even when the library is closed.

In answer to a question from the mayor, the architect said it could be completed in a year, if there were no major hold-ups.

The mayor congratulated Martel on the excellent plan. "You haven't disturbed the existing building and beautiful stained glass windows," he said. The mayor foresaw some problem with zoning.

REPAIRS
Cr. Bill Hunter raised the

question of cost per square foot which he thought was excessive. Martel explained that the estimated total included the necessary repairs and changes to the existing building which would rate higher per square foot than the cost to the new part. Martel put the average cost on the total 10,000 sq. ft. at \$20. a sq. ft. He said the outside construction would harmonize as closely as possible with the existing old stone.

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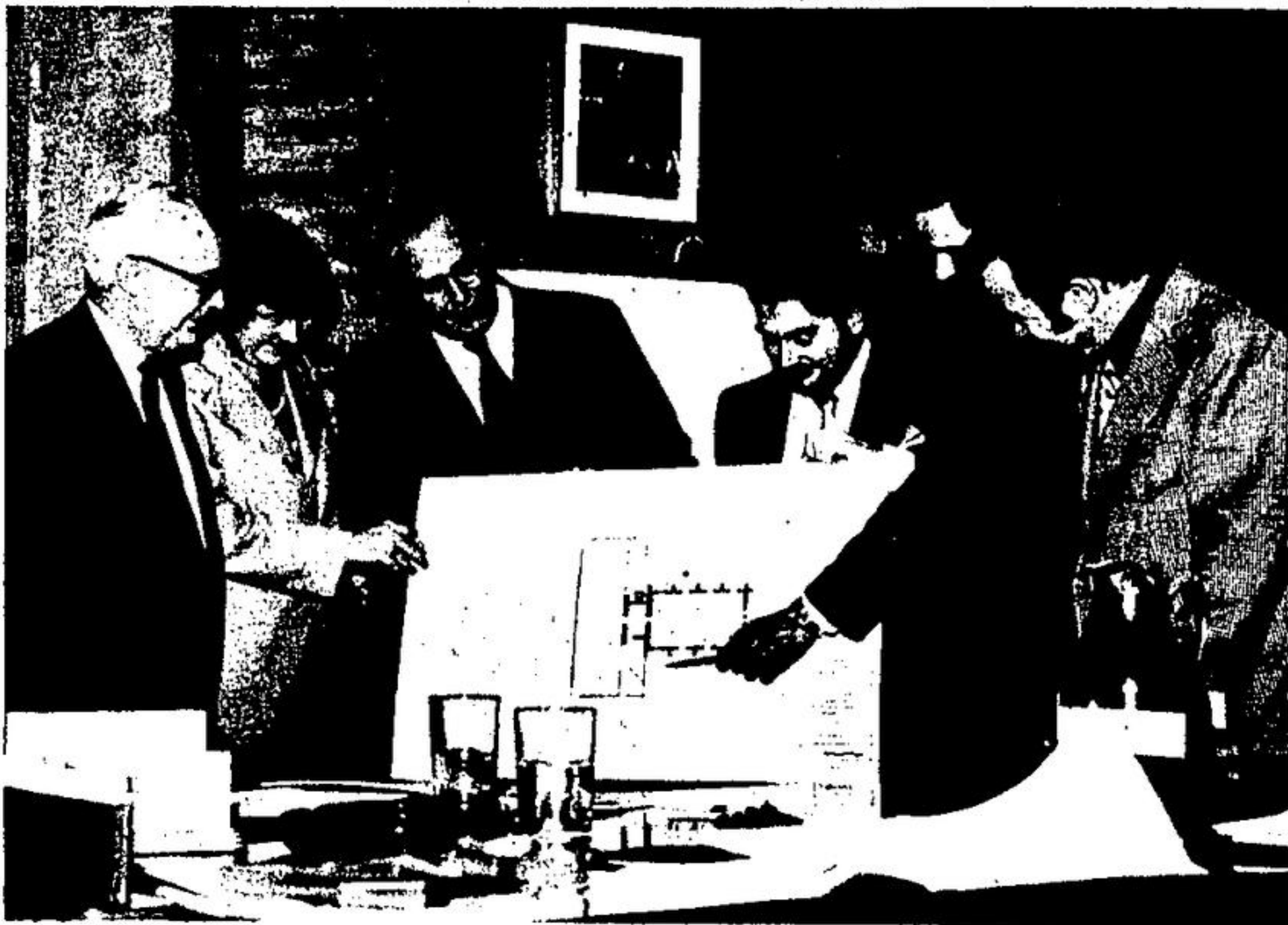
