These environmental changes often decide whether salmon live or die, and often indicate the destiny of whole

Of the salmon's various environments, the most prone to rapid and often fethal change are the rivers and streams. Natural variations in climatic conditions produce droughts and floods, both of which can wipe out salmon runs, and the explosive expansion of the pulp and lumber industries pose new threats. Improper utilization of the forests which surround and tower over spawning grounds often change the character and properties of the streams, and makes them less capable of supporting alevin and adult.

DEADLY

Hydroelectric dams are deadly to salmon runs, and despite all the ingenuity of man in designing ladders and other by-passes, experience has proven that rivers with high dams cannot support salmon in substantial quantities.
