Fisherman Is Not Salmon's Only Enemy

The fisherman, of course, is only one of salmon's many enemies. Throughout the course of their lives, they encounter several environments, and these differ from season to season and year to year. These environmental changes often decide whether salmon live or die, and often indicate the destiny of whole runs. Of the salmon's various environments, the most prone to rapid and often lethal change are the rivers and streams. Natural variations in climatic conditions produce droughts and floods, both of which can wipe out salmon runs, and the explosive expansion of the pulp and lumber industries pose new threats. Improper utilization of the forests which surround and tower over spawning grounds often change the character and properties of the streams, and makes them less capable of supporting alevin and adult.

DEADLY
Hydroelectric dams are deadly to salmon runs, and despite all the ingenuity of man in designing ladders and other by-passes, experience has proven that rivers with high dams cannot support salmon in substantial quantities. Civilization itself creates dangerous conditions, for through discharging of untreated or inadequately treated waste, urban areas can push pollution of waters towards and

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often beyond limits tolerable to these factors on their growth and survival.

PROMISING
Out of this research has already come a most promising tool. Artificial spawning channels, with selected gravel composition, controlled water flow and temperature, eliminate the hazards of floods and droughts and reduce the dangers of heavy silt and logging. Such channels are already in full production on some B.C. streams.

Scientists and the industry are confident that they will prove to be a significant supplement to the production of salmon from natural streams. New knowledge will ensure better management. With more precise control over the most important part of the salmon's existence, scientists hope not only to restore stocks to their former levels but also hope to boost production to former peak capacities.
