

# Georgetown Youth Bowlers Dominate Central Ontario

For these past two weekends the Central Ontario Zone Finals of the Four Steps to Stardom have been a - and once again the Youth Bowlers from Georgetown Bowl completely dominated. Of the 14 different bowling centres competing, Georgetown Bowl walked away with the most victories.

Bowling centres from Guelph, Acton, Milton, Oakville, Port Credit, Clarkson, Streetsville, Bramalea, Bolton, Brampton and Georgetown participated in the tournament.

The bowlers were competing in one of 12 different events in six separate divisions - which are already decided according to age and sex. There were six singles events and six team events (one of each in every division) with one winning single and team from each.

**ADVANCE**

A total of 36 bowlers will now advance to the Southern Ontario Provincial Championships, with a chance to win and travel to Saskatchewan for the National Championships.

Of the six Georgetown singles, two finished on top - each with margins of over 50 pins on the second place finisher.

Among our six Georgetown teams, four walked away in first place-winning by margins of over 100 pins, while the other two teams placed strong seconds.

This means that Georgetown bowlers captured 22 of a possible 36 spots. Our closest competitor was Sportsman's Bowlerama in Guelph with six spots. Avondale Lanes in Bramalea took five spots while Brampton Lanes, Milton Bowlway, and Crystal Lanes in Brampton each took one spot.

# Centre-Ice Fracas Ends Dunnville-Raider Game After Just 19 Minutes

Second place in the Niagara District Intermediate A Hockey League belongs jointly to Georgetown Raiders and Port Colborne Sailors this week.

The lolly perch, apparently far beyond the reach of the Georgetown aggregation only a couple of months ago, was attained here Sunday night when Raiders stomped on the Sailors 7 to 3 to collect points number 35 and 36 which put them eye-to-eye with the visitors in the rankings.

Both have identical records of 18 wins and 16 losses in 34 games. Port Colborne has a better offensive record with 162 goals to Raiders' 149, but Georgetown outshines them in the goals-against department, 134 to 145.

Neither club is going to catch Dundas Merchants who have an additional 10 points and a game in hand. Welland currently holds down the fourth playoff spot six points back of the Raiders and Sailors.

Georgetown puts the cup on regular schedule games a week from this Saturday.

**SPILLING BOARD**

Winning three games in four nights was the spring board that catapulted Raiders into playoff territory.

They needed an overtime period to get by Dunnville Mudcats in Dunnville Thursday night. They were awarded two more points Friday when a first period restaging of the Little Ice Horn wipe-out left Dunnville with too few players to continue.

Raiders and Sailors stuck to hockey Sunday, though it was a rough haul, and gave well over 800 spectators their money's worth. Many of them were cashing in the tickets they lined-up to get Friday night when the Raider executive issued the passes to about 480 who had their entertainment cut short.

**HATTRICK**

Paul Robinson spearheaded the Raiders snipers with three goals and an assist against Port Colborne. Tom Gillis had a goal to show for his best performance of the campaign, while Bill Currie and Tom Gilbert notched the other two.

Gilbert's was a reward for frustration. He had had at least three threatening chances earlier but was outguessed by Sailor goalie Hob Stewart.

Later he tangled with Jean Latulippe in the game's only scrap.

Raiders peppered 50 shots at the Port cage while Pallet handled just 32.

The time clock never got past 10:32 of the first period Friday. That's when a chippy meeting with Dunnville, the second in two nights, broke out into full scale war.

**LEAVE BENCHES**

It started when Ray Inglis and Dunnville's George Maxwell traded punches in the game's second fight, and developed from there. Players from both teams poured over the boards with sticks raised threateningly, but nobody swung knuckles did all the damage.

Raiders Neil Cotton, Blake Inglis, and Bob Bingham and Dunnville's Keith Austin, Wayne Schweyer, Bill Barnett, and Tom Bowker were slapped with game misconducts, and Ray Inglis, Gord Thompson and Dave McMenemy for Georgetown, and Maxwell and Bob Green of Dunnville took fighting sentences.

One of the Mudcat combatants was knocked unconscious and had to be taken to the arena medical room for attention.

The first period started at 8:30 and it was past 10 when the game was declared finished - over a minute remained on the clock. Goals by Doug Selby and Blake Inglis had given Georgetown a 2-0 lead.

**CARRY-OVER**

The bad feeling was a carry-over from Thursday's clash in Dunnville when a rough contest produced three fights, a game misconduct to Raiders' Bill Currie and Dunnville's Glen Cryster.

Robinson shot the overtime winner in that one. Tom Gilbert had a two goal night while Bill Currie hit for the other Raider goal. Ted Schofield scored twice and Maxwell once for Dunnville.

Raiders' next home game is tomorrow night when Welland provides the competition.



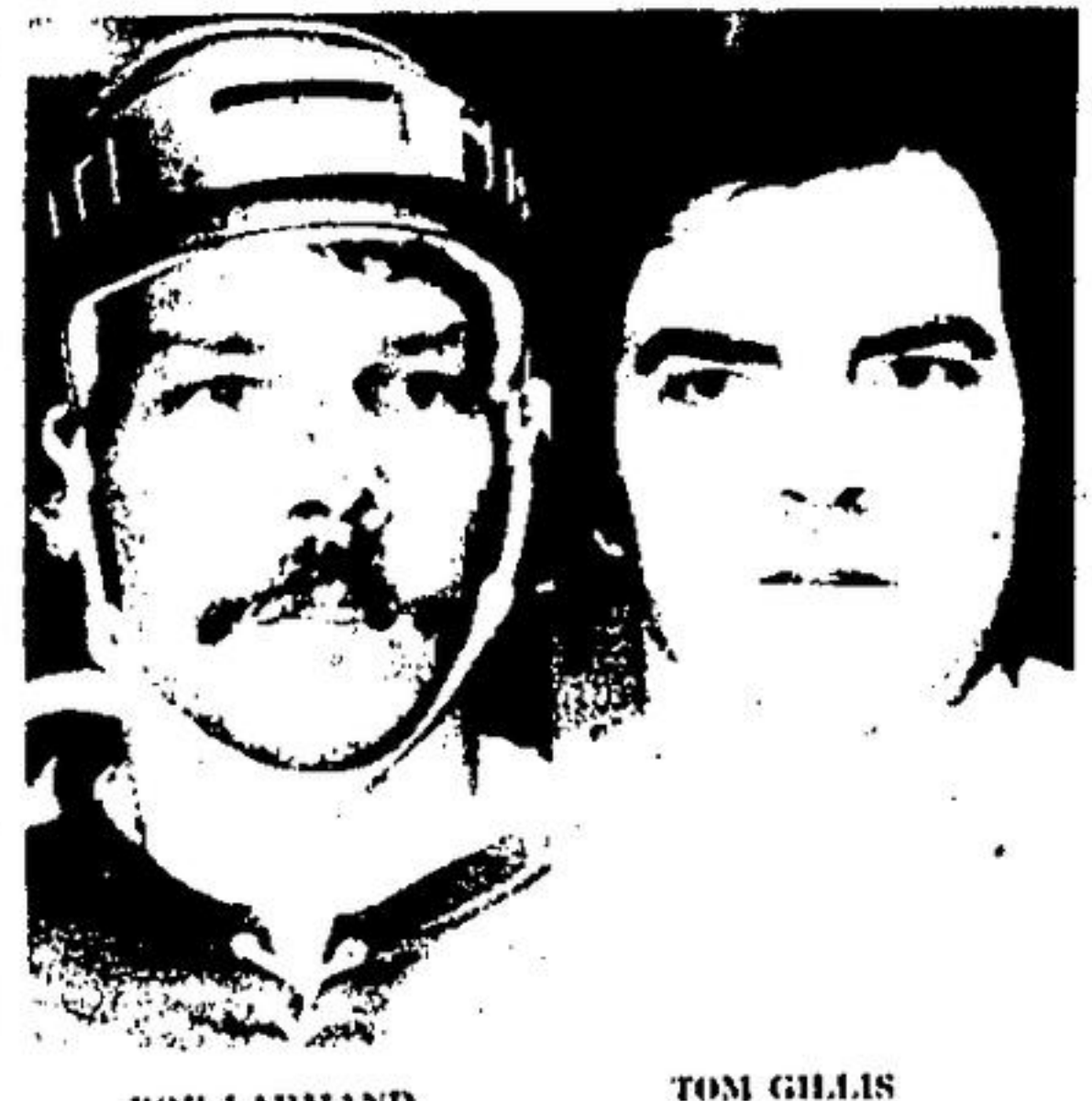
