**Tells Pork Producers "Don't Be Ashamed of Higher Food Prices"**

The annual meeting of the Ontario Pork Producers' Association, who briefly dwelled on the higher food prices. He stated that the higher prices farmers are receiving for pork and beef at present are contributing to the higher cost of food index. He stated that farmers should not be ashamed of the higher prices they are receiving as these prices are required to maintain production with the high cost of inputs for production.

He also spoke on the licensing of pork producers and suggested the possibility of a \$10.00 licence fee. The main reasoning behind licensing pork producers would be to establish a firmer list of hog producers.
