PRODUCTION WINNERS
National Directors of the Holstein Friesian Association of Canada present at the meeting were Earl Osborne from Wellington, Bruce Reid from Wentworth, and Clarence Eby from Waterloo.

Joe Snyder, Holstein Friesian Fieldman announced the winners in production for Halton. Woodgreen Vicky Legend (Titania II, a nine-year-old cow in the herd of T. J. Mulroy, Milton RR4, had a superior production record of 29,683 of milk, 1.02 of fat in 365 days. The other superior production cow for Halton was

Sylvia Sovereign Devries, the 13-year-old in the herd of Gordon R. Sinclair & Sons, Burlington, with 19,689 of milk, 1.27 of fat in 365 days.

ESSENTIAL
Guest speaker was Hon. Jim Snow, Minister of Public Works, who spoke on the new Regional Government plans for Halton. He stated that such plans were essential for effective planning and land use control.

In a discussion on the difficulty of transferring ownership of land from father to son, Mr. Snow agreed that family farm operations have to be able to be turned over from one generation to another.

Owners Will Co-Operate If Town Wants Log Cabin

The question of the log cabin on Mill Street remained unanswered after a council meeting Thursday night attended by owner H. Gladman. Council could not decide whether the town should acquire it or for what purpose. Gladman told council he had already committed himself to sell to a Mr. Goodhead who had poured footings for it, but he was willing to try to get out of the deal if the town wanted the log cabin.

NOT HISTORICAL
"Why does the town want it, and where would we put it," asked Cr. Mike Armstrong who

pointed out it was not a historical building. "I've been around longer than it has," he added.

Mayor Bill Smith said the matter was raised in a letter from Roger Frost who asked the town to preserve old buildings. Gladman said the land was allocated for parking for the bank.

LOOKS BETTER
Cr. Phil Siddall suggested the log cabin would look better than a parking lot and could be used by the town for an information office or a recreation depart-

ment office. He said it could be moved to Cedarvale, if the town didn't want it on Mill Street. "I apologize to Mr. Gladman for bringing him here, when we don't know what we want," said Cr. Armstrong.

SELL OR LEASE
Gladman said he didn't really know what to do, or whether he would sell or lease the property to the town if they wanted it. The mayor asked him to let them know when he decided whether the cabin would be sold or leased to the town, if they decided to acquire it.

S & S Fuse Rejectors Demonstrated

Fuse rejectors, a new plastic plug which prevents accidental or intentional over-fusing in electrical fuse panels, were introduced and discussed at the February meeting of Halton County Fire Prevention Bureau.

Bill Leslie of Smith and Stone, Georgetown, brought samples of the new product to the Bureau meeting last week in Milton. Circular in shape and threaded to fit a standard fuse panel, the plastic rejectors are inserted into the fuse socket and their shape prevents a homeowner from inserting a larger fuse than needed.

MANDATORY
The rejectors are to become mandatory in all new home construction on May 1. Mr. Leslie pointed out owners of older homes should also use rejectors, he said. "Many older homes are underwired and overfused, and present a potential electrical fire hazard," he said. Bureau members agreed the fuse rejectors are a good idea.

Smith and Stone manufactures one rejector which will only accept a 15 amp fuse, and one which takes only a 20 amp fuse. Mr. Leslie left samples

with Bureau members to demonstrate to homeowners.

In other business, the Bureau agreed to chairman Jim Coulson's suggestion to reappoint last year's committee chairman. They are: literature, Chief J. D. Wilson of Oakville; publicity, Chief A. E. Clement and Roy Downs of Milton; poster contest, Ivan Clarridge of Milton; auditors, B. Fowler and M. Holmes of Acton. Fire chiefs Wilson, Holmes, Clement and Ken Bukema of Georgetown were named a committee to arrange programs for meetings.

North Side GO Passengers Will Use Tunnel

The GO trains scheduled to operate from Georgetown in December, will be shut off overnight, and will be stored in a heated building, representatives of GO Transit told a committee of the whole here Thursday night. They will stay overnight only four nights a week, coming up from Toronto early Monday morning and staying in Toronto over the week end.

Stu Clelland, project manager, said they take half an hour to warm up, before starting their run. There will be no waiting at the station to board, since the three trains will already be there, and boarding will be in order of the first train on the nearest track.

An underground walkway will be built at the north side of the station for use only by GO train users. At night gates will be closed at both ends of the tunnel.

ACT AS BATTLE
Clelland said the building should act as a battle and would hold any noise level down considerably. He said the company was also working on a muffling system for the engines.

In reply to a question from Cr. Hoy Booth about plans to increase the service, Clelland said there were no plans at this time, but that would depend on the demand.

The whole area would be enclosed by a five foot fence, while the paved parking lot will hold 200 to 250 cars. A separate spot for "kiss and ride" drivers, as Clelland called wives driving husbands to the train is planned. This will also be used for bus loading and unloading. He said the company was not overly concerned if hotel patrons used the parking lot, since the times of usage did not coincide.

FREE PARKING
Clelland assured Cr. Booth the parking was free to all commuters. He added there would be very little change to the existing station. Tickets for the GO transit will be bought at another booth, outside the existing station.

The entrances and exits have not been finalized, but Clelland favoured entering from Queen Street and exiting at Elgin. Council decided to ask the works department for a recommendation.
