



# Hundreds Watch Students' Production of 'Anything Goes'

This weekend, the students and staff at GDHS wrote another chapter in the growing history of the school. Georgetown was given its first Broadway spectacular musical by the school and the large crowds proved that the town was ready for the performance.

**ANYTHING GOES**  
Success crowned the performers at the play, actors, band members and all other helpers when huge crowds appeared for the three performances. Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Hundreds of people from the town came to GDHS to see the spectacle aboard the S.S. America, a trans-Atlantic liner bound for England from New York. The performances were dedicated to Mr. Ernie Forgrave, GDHS's retiring business manager.

The play began, after an awakening overture from the band, as Elisha J. Whitney, an elderly Wall Street tycoon played by Don Dodge, entered and introduced both himself and the setting, a trans-Atlantic ocean-liner in 1934. A reporter and photographer, played by Deborah Anne Phipps and Yolanda Sevenster, were taking pictures for their magazine and introduced many other characters.

Hope Harcourt, played by Carrie Dodge and Muriel Holmes, entered next with her mother, played by Daryl Harding, and her fiancé, Sir Evelyn Oakleigh, played by Dave Barber. When their pictures had been taken, Bishop Henry T. Dobson, played by Larry Broadfield, and his two Chinese converts, performed by George Specie and Leo Postalwaden, entered.

When they were having their pictures taken, a young girl was doing poses in front of them, unawares to the pious Bishop. Next Irena Sweeney, played by Alison Vickory, came onto the stage with her four angels and her troupe of dancers. A fanfare welcomed the evangelist night-club singer to the S.S. America and the girls posed for the photographer.

**ENTER BILLY**  
After the poses, Billy Crocker, played by Drew Markham, entered and sang "Your the Top" with Reno, after the rest of the passengers left. Billy was fired by his boss Elisha J. Whitney, but was soon rehired. When he discovered that Hope was sailing, he decided that he would board the ship and convince his love not to marry Sir Evelyn. They exit in search of a gangster dressed like a preacher and mixed up with the Bishop.

When the dust settled, Moonface Martin and his moll, Bonnie, played by Jack Langeedyk, Cheryl McMeilly and Peggy Levers, enter with clumsy stealth. Moon runs into his first problem when he meets the Bishop. He manages to get through this first ordeal and merges into a group of passengers to evade the purser, Angela Shenton, and the stewardess, Tracy Harrington. When the purser and a couple of sailors drag the innocent Bishop off the boat, the company sang "Bon Voyage" and the voyage had begun.

**SCENE TWO**  
In the second scene Sir Evelyn, who is seasick left his fiancé with Billy when the ship began to roll. Hope, Billy and the chorus sang "Delovely" and Billy and Hope were left with the night and the sea. That morning, Billy found that his boss, Mr. Whitney was in the next cabin to his and Moon's. Moon managed to get Mr. Whitney's glasses, but found that the purser was looking for Billy, who they had mistaken for Snake Eyes-Johnson, Public Enemy Number One.

They sent Bonnie to get a sailor suit for Billy and she sang "Heaven Hop" with dancing accompaniment. Billy having been disguised, he schemed with Reno and Moon in the fifth scene. They decided to frame Sir Evelyn into breaking his engagement and frolicked with the tune "Friendship".

In Sir Evelyn's cabin, Reno managed to teach Evelyn many suggestive American phrases but couldn't get him to do the wrong thing. Moon flew into the cabin and promptly accused Sir Evelyn at exactly what he hadn't done. Their plan was frustrated further when Reno fell in love with Sir Evelyn and later on deck sang "I Get a Kick out of You".

On another part of the deck Billy was frantically evading the purser, masquerading as a sailor, an old woman, a chef and finally as a Spanish diplomat.

When he, at last, ran out of disguises, he was recognised as Public Enemy No. 1, but was idolized by the passengers. He lost the favour of Hope when he gained the worship of the passengers, cheering him up. Reno led the chorus and the dancers in the song "Anything Goes."

**IDOLIZED**  
The second act began with two songs, first the passengers and "Public Enemy No. 1" and then Bonnie led the dancers in "Let's Step Out."

Billy is further idolized by everyone and when Reno and Sir Evelyn are left alone on deck, they romance and sing "Let's Misbehave". Moon and Reno are then chosen to lead a religious service for everyone: Moon preaches a meaningless sermon to confused passengers but when Reno takes over from him, she manages to uncover both Moon and Billy, who are thrown in the brig. She led the company in "Blow Gabriel".

In the brig, Billy and Moon overcome their sadness when Moon sang "Be Like the Bluebird." Billy found out that Hope was being married on deck soon and had to get out. They began a poker game with the two Chinese converts who cleaned out the third class in a crap game.

In the final scene, the dancers, angels, and Irena begin with "Take Me Back to Manhattan". The scene moves on to the wedding of Sir Evelyn to Hope. In the nick of time, Billy and Moon, dressed as Chinese, stop the wedding and all is revealed. Reno gets Sir Evelyn, Billy gets Hope, Mr. Whitney got Mrs. Harcourt and Moon got a shock to find he was not even a public enemy any more. The play ended with the Finale after two and a half hours, a truly magnificent success for the students and staff of GDHS.

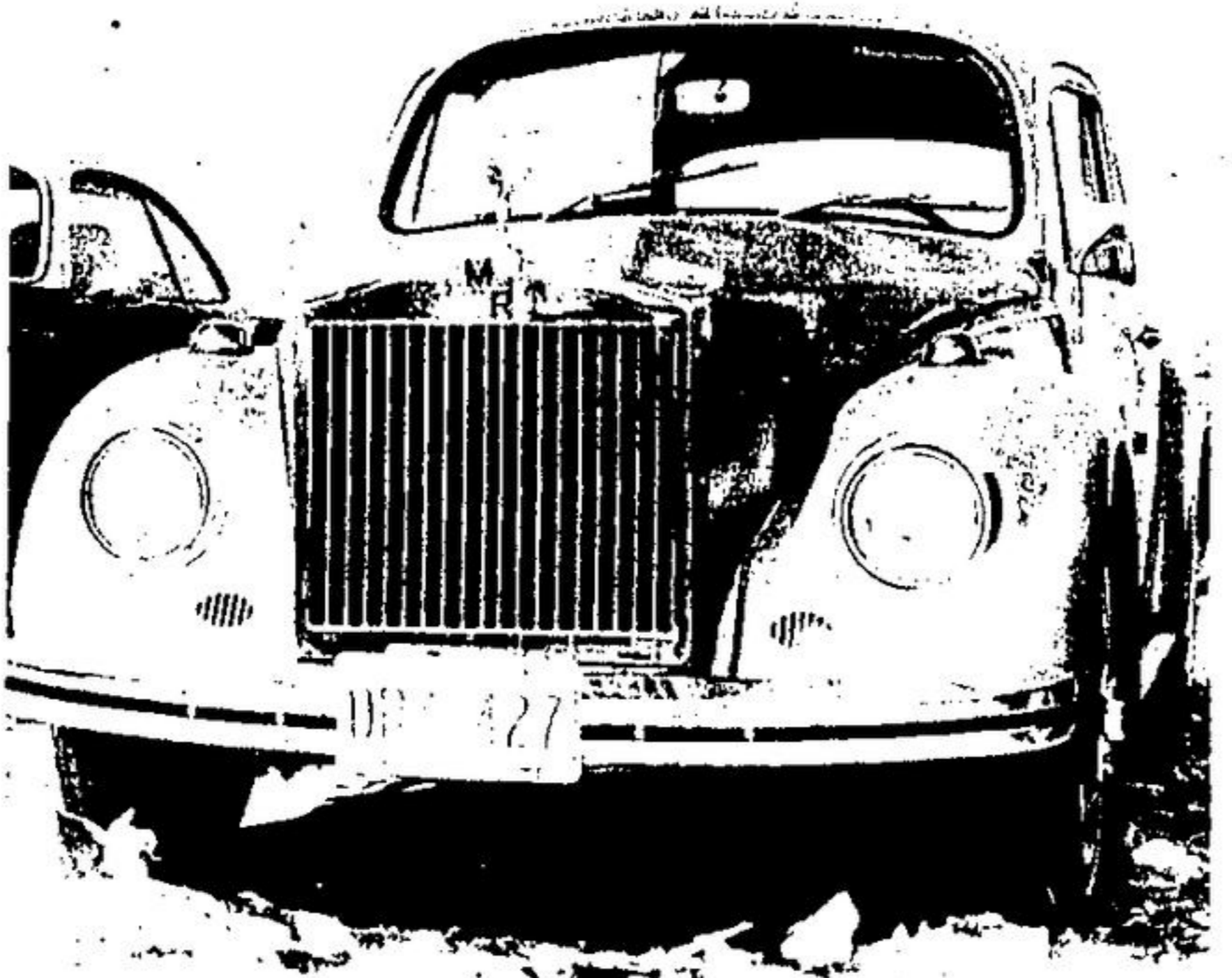
**1973 IN FOCUS**
