

Blake Inglis Leads Raiders Into Niagara League Finals

When the Ontario Intermediate A hockey championship is decided this season the defending champions will be there.

Georgetown Raiders shook off the effects of disastrous first period, Friday night in Welland, and scrambled back for a 7-5 win which completed their four game semi-final sweep over the Merchants.

Raiders, who dominated every game in the series, were rocked back on their heels in the first period when Welland piled up a 4-1 lead. But from that point the hosts were a dying hockey club.

Raiders had eroded the difference to 5-4 by the end of

the second period, and blanked Merchants in the third while pumping in three more goals.

Welland's first marker at 6:45 was the result of a three-on-two break with playing coach Gerry

Maney setting up Fred Bassi for the score. Ray Evans was serving a tripping minor when Merchants added their second goal at 16:20. Brian Angelo the marksman from the point.

Maney accounted for the third and fourth Merchant markers in the period's final minute, the first right from the draw, and the second by splitting the defense.

CARELESS
Junior Tibbetts got Raiders' first period goal at 17:35. A careless clearing play was knocked down by Tibbetts who swept it behind Pete Jenkins before the Merchant netminder could get set.

A drop pass from Jim Blair to John Boyce just inside the Welland line led to Raiders' second goal at 1:29 of the middle period. The slap shot deflected off a Welland leg.

Welland's final goal was Brian Law's at 13:14 a clear cut breakaway after Raider MVP Bill Currie rang the puck off a Welland goal post.

Georgetown scored twice in the last two and half minutes of the period. Blake Inglis counted both of them on backhand shots, the first at 17:34 from Tom Galis and the second at 19:15 from his own rebound.

HAT TRICK
Dave McMenemy's slap shot finally got Raiders on even terms with Merchants at 1:24 of the third, and two minutes later Inglis turned the rebound from Tom Gilbert's shot into his hat trick goal and the winner.

Georgetown's seventh goal was a source of embarrassment for Pete Jenkins. He was heading for the Welland bench so his club could ice six skaters with a minute left when Terry Holmes spoiled his plans. Holmes got possession of the puck and caught Jenkins half way between net and bench. He denied the unguard twine at 19:14.

Doug Selby, Ray Inglis and Jack Kemshead were the Raiders not in uniform for this one, but Paul Robinson may as well not have been. The club's leading scorer had to labour in a pair of borrowed skates when his own were left in Georgetown. He gave it a try for a period and then had to give up.

ONLY LEAGUE
Raiders were in Dundas in large number Tuesday night when Dundas and Port Colborne Sailors played the deciding game in their series. Winners there play Raiders for the league and provincial title since the Niagara District circuit is the OHA's only Intermediate A setup. If that title is decided by April 6, there could be an additional series for a Canadian championship.
