

Pass, Dribble, Shoot Contest Tests Skills

Georgetown Optimists Club held a Pass, Dribble, and Shoot Contest at St. Francis of Assisi School, Saturday. Optimist John Shaw administered the contest with help from Clarence Baker, Don Leinweber, George Stein, and Roy Martin. There were 101 contestants representing six schools and six teams.

Basketball involves three basic skills, which made up the skills of the contest. Passing ability was tested by each contestant throwing 3 direct and three bounce passes at a target area of 12 inches in diameter and three feet from the floor. Contestants shot from distances according to age.

There were five points scored every time the target was hit. Each contestant had six shots at the basket for 10 points a piece, three from any position and three from the foul line. The dribbling had each contestant dribble for six seconds around an equilateral triangle. Points were scored for each foot travelled. Each leg of the triangle was 20 feet.

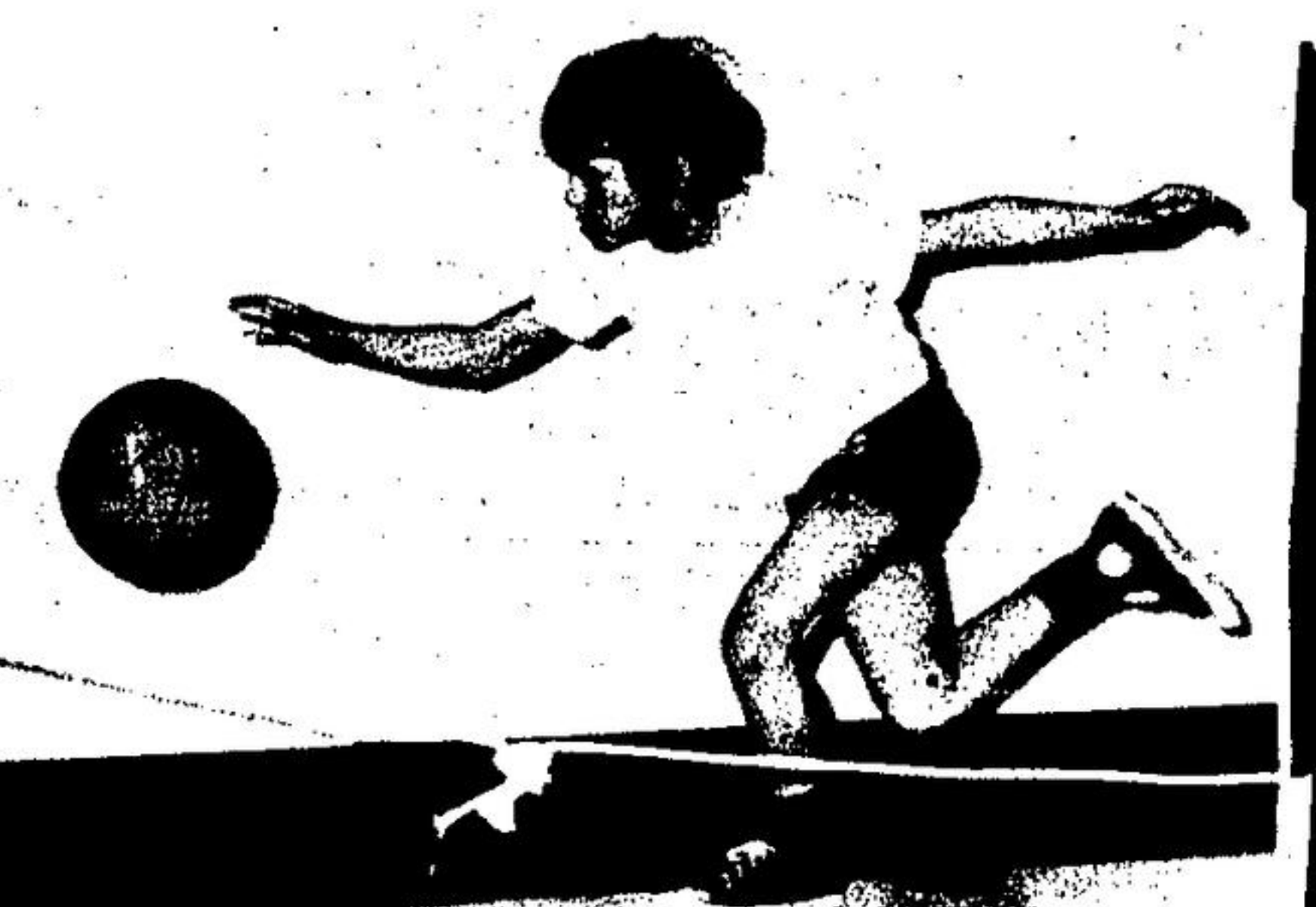

PUBLIC ANNOUNCEMENT

Carriage of CBLFT, Channel 25 Toronto

The Commission set out in its July 16, 1971 Policy Statement on Cable Television certain priorities for carriage of stations on cable television systems. These priorities included:

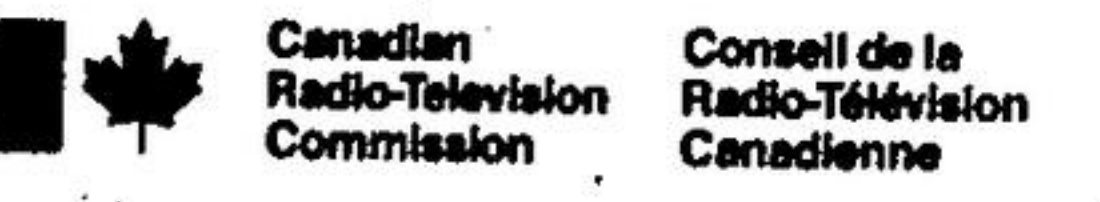
- All Canadian television stations whose official Grade A contour encloses any part of the licensed area of the cable television system. Grade A stations are called local stations.
- All Canadian television stations whose official Grade B contour encloses any part of the licensed area of the cable television system unless it is a private affiliate forming part of the same Canadian network as a local station. Grade B contour stations are called regional stations.
- Any Canadian station whose official Grade B contour does not enclose any part of the cable television system licensed area which is not affiliated to the same Canadian network as a local or regional station and where reception is economically practical and technically feasible. Stations whose Grade B contour does not enclose any part of the cable television system licensed area are called distant stations.

The Commission held a Public Hearing in June 1972 to discuss the application of this policy to the carriage of channels in the Greater Toronto area.

CBLFT, Channel 25 Toronto will commence broadcasting on March 23, 1973. The Commission authorizes the cable television licensee listed below who have applied for carriage of CBLFT, Channel 25, Toronto to add this station to their systems when it commences broadcasting. All cable television systems within the Grade B contour of CBLFT will be expected to apply to the Commission for carriage of CBLFT, Channel 25, Toronto when it commences broadcasting.
