Clergy Comment



Easter Means That Christ Is Alive

'Tis the spring of souls today; Christ hath burst his prison, And from three days' sleep in death As a sun hath risen: All the winter of our sins, Long and dark, is flying From his light, to whom we give Laud and praise undying. —St. John of Damascus

"It is the duty of every confirmed person, after due preparation, to partake of the Holy Communion frequently, and particularly on the greater Holy-days of which Easter is the chief." This direction may not be much of an example of the striking English prose of which "The Book of Common Prayer" of the Anglican Church is so famous, but it embodies a great and venerable tradition, whose influence can be traced from one end of Christendom to the other. Apart from the weekly observance of the Lord's Day, the annual feast of the Resurrection is the most ancient feature of the Christian Calendar, and all through the Christian centuries it has stood out as the great holy-day of the Church year. In the Mediterranean world of the first century, in Medieval Europe, in the young Christian communities of the Americas and the still younger Churches of Africa and the Orient — in short, wherever the Gospel has been heard, the Easter Festival is the crown of the year's worship.

In outward appearance the Paschal vigil of fifth century Rome, the "all night Liturgy" of the Orthodox East, the Easter morning Eucharist of an Anglican congregation in Canada or Australia, the "sunrise services" and splendid musical offerings of North American Protestantism, and the hundred other ways of keeping the Festival are very different; but they all reflect the common Christian conviction that the celebration of Easter must dominate the Church's worship because the message of Easter is the foundation of Christianity.

The primary meaning of Easter for Jesus' followers on the first Easter morning was not the announcement, "Because I live, you shall live also." They were glad because Jesus was still alive. As the Easter Gospel puts it, "Then were the disciples glad when they saw the Lord." So Easter means basically that Christ is alive.

Through the centuries "Christ Risen" became the experience of Christians and became the impulse behind the highest and best in our civilization and culture. It was written across the great paintings of Raphael, Da Vinci, and Michelangelo. It fired the music of Handel, Bach and Beethoven. And it inspired the poetry of Dante, Milton and Browning.

And after almost two thousand Easters' Christians with cavalier deportment and the experience of Christ alive will come by thousands to meet Him in the Sacrament and to greet this Easter morning with the triumphant strains of, "Christ the Lord is risen today."

Program Trades Pupil-Teacher Ratio For Time: Principal

Jack Reed principal of Stewarttown Senior Public School told The Herald their math program is a matter of grading student-teacher ratio for time.

Teachers to do constant assessment of the students' performances, give additional assistance to students who need it on an individual basis, and provide material for students who advance quickly a chance to enrich their education.

Mr. Reed referred to a statement made by James W. Singleton, director of education, at last Thursday's Board meeting, that staff resources were distributed to schools throughout the system equally on the basis of size and program. Mr. Reed explained that the allocation of how that staff operates in the school is the principal's responsibility, as long as the core of material in any subject as outlined by the provincial government and the Halton County Board of Education is covered.

Peter Gardiner and Lu Zander teach all the mathematics to the 532 students at Stewarttown. Last June the school received approval to introduce the new program. The Board gave the go ahead to tear down a partition in the school and make a large classroom. The two teachers spent the summer organizing a math laboratory. Mr. Gardiner put 140 man hours in making 50 math resource cassettes.

The lab is stocked with visual aids and two filing cabinets.

containing tests, work sheets, and material on all the areas of study, which students can progress through at their own rate. Records are kept on the student progress as note books and continuous testing results are recorded.

GREW FROM QUESTION
"The whole idea grew," states Mr. Gardiner, "from a question asked of me by Don Thomas, our assistant superintendent, during a philosophical discussion in 1971. The question was 'What do you feel is the time and place in teaching for telling?' By 'telling we were referring to the place for teacher directives as opposed to the ability of the pupil to decide when he was ready to proceed to the application.' From this beginning Mr. Gardiner developed, with the assistance of Mr. Zander and full support of principal Jack Reed, the math program at Stewarttown.

ALTERNATIVE
Mr. Arn Tiggelaar, co-ordinator of pure and applied sciences, explained that this system provides enrichment to the clever student, as an alternative to accelerating the student; meaning having the student skip a grade.

Jack Reed explained that at last Thursday's board meeting it was deciphered that John Bellamy was not complaining about the program, but the student-teacher ratio. Mr. Tiggelaar says that Cen-
