Will Poll Residents Before Okaying North Line Trains

The revival of a steam powered tourist train from Georgetown to Allandale ran into opposition Monday night when William Zilio of Terra Cotta, claiming to speak for other residents in the area, said he was opposed to the plan.

Sherwood Home of Milton and M. C. Black of Esqueving, members of the Ontario Rail Association, told council of the proposed summer tourist steam train starting from Georgetown, and going through Terra Cotta, Cheltenham, Inglewood to Allandale.

Hume said the Ontario Rail Association, formerly known as the Credit Valley Railroad, was founded by a group of enthusiasts who wanted to preserve "the iron horse." He pointed to similar operations in Europe and United States, which were prospering.

ABANDONMENT
He explained that the C.N.R. has to seek abandonment of the tracks from the Canadian Rail Transport Commission, before their association is allowed to use the trackage. He asked council for a letter approving the abandonment by the C.N.R. He said the Association

already has such letters from the provincial and federal members of parliament in the areas affected by the track.

Mal Black reassured Deputy Reeve Len Cox that all crossings would be protected by the old fashioned wig way signs and by bells. All culverts and fences would be maintained by the Ontario Rail Association, said Black.

Reeve Tom Hill again cast the deciding vote, Monday night, at Esqueving council, to allow the Ukrainian Youth Camp, to renovate the old farmhouse into two housekeeping units for summer use only.

A second vote was necessary because the previous vote, with the same result, Crs. George Maltby and Wilfrid Leslie in favour, and Deputy Reeve Len Cox and Cr. Richard Howitt opposed, approved only the retention of the farmhouse, but not the conversion into two housekeeping units.

Stephen Kuz, appearing for Camp Weselka, lot 31, Con. 4, told council he has assumed the previous vote entitled him to a building permit, but had been told by Clerk Treasurer Delmar French, the permit would not be issued until the housekeeping units were approved.

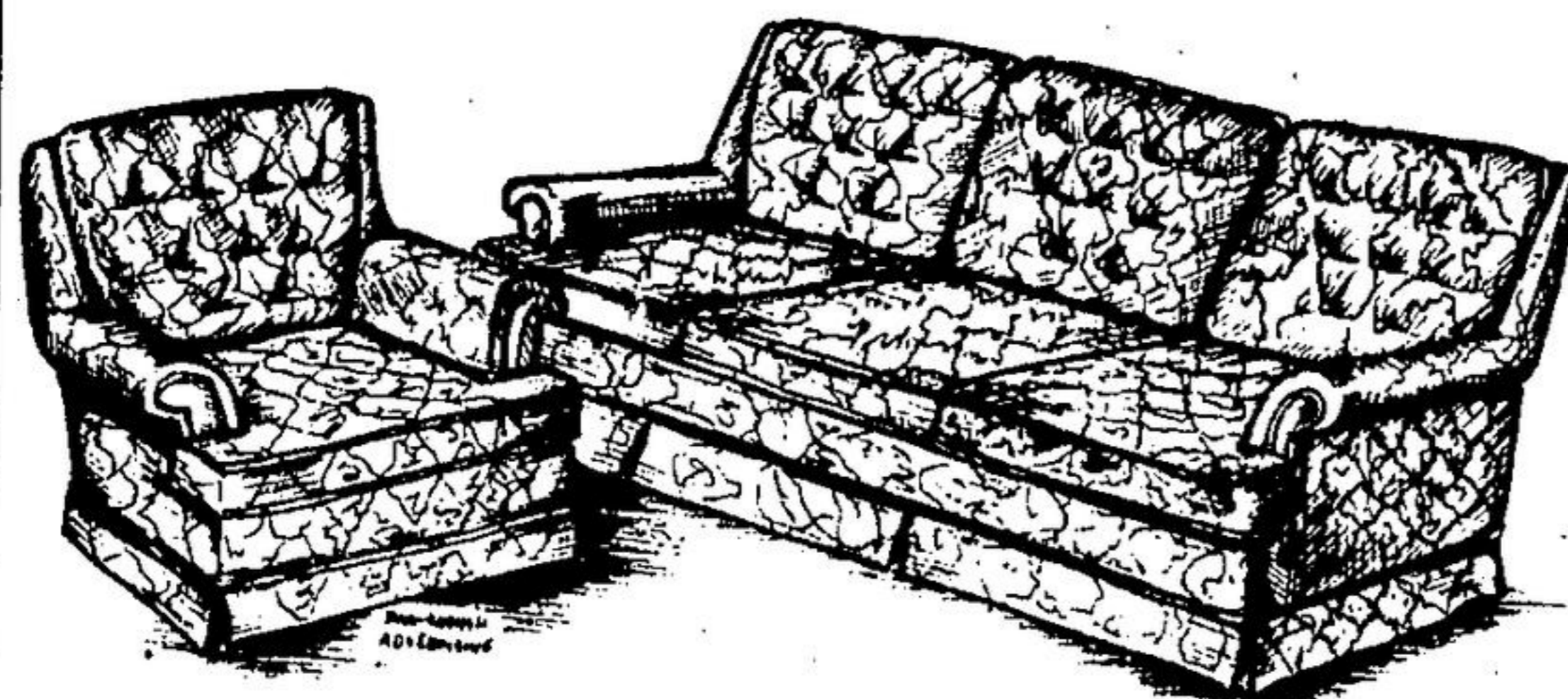
WOULD DEMOLISH

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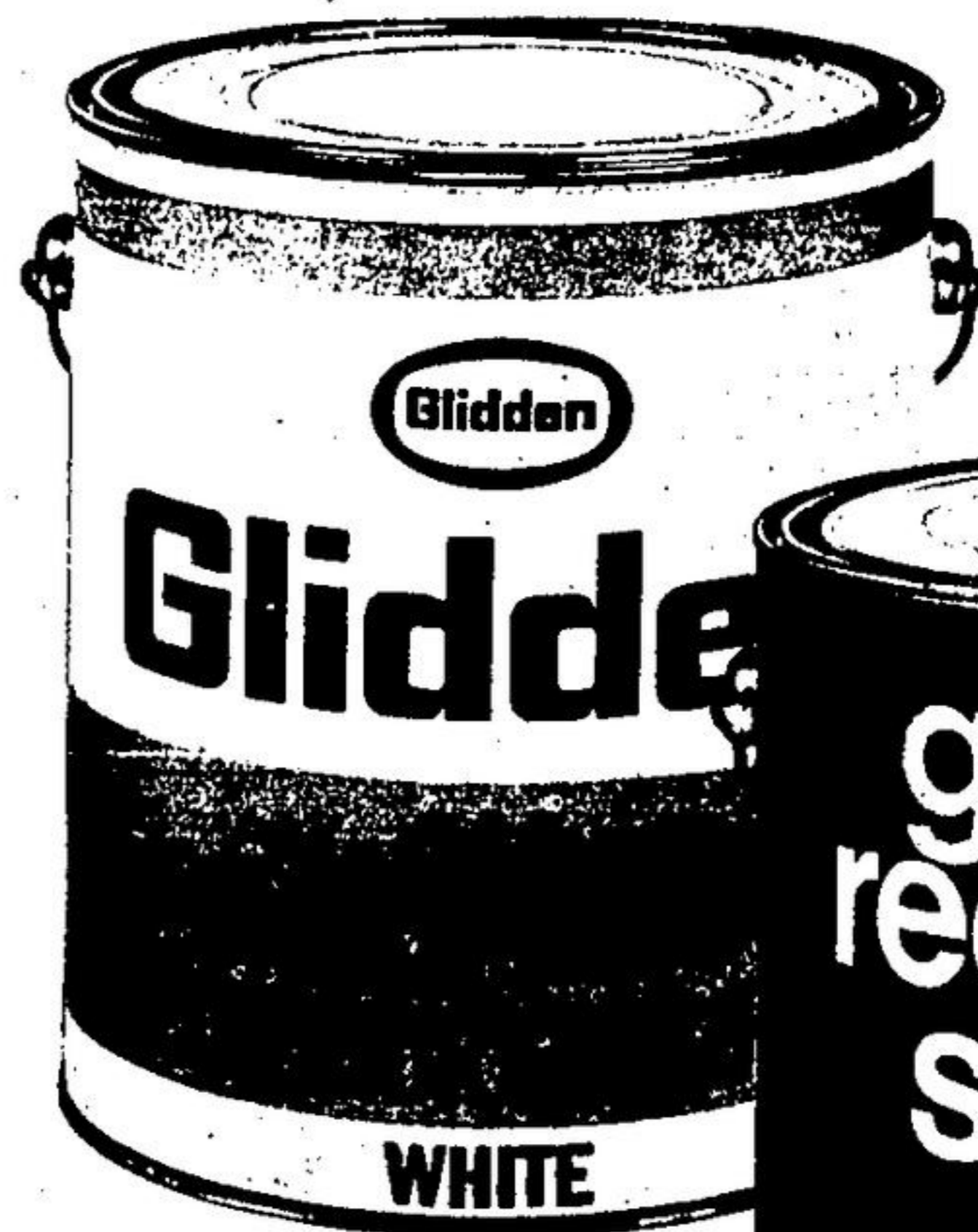
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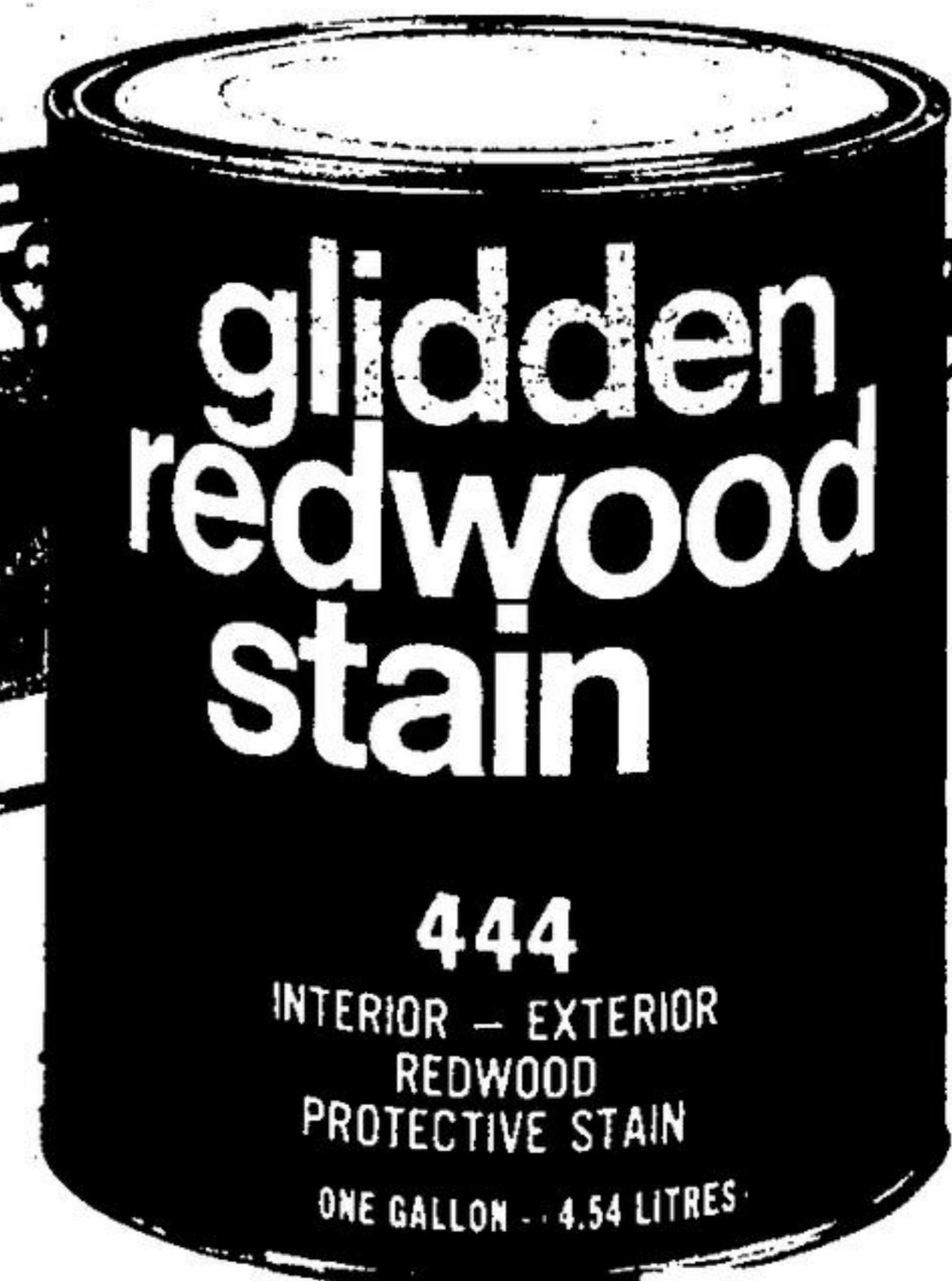
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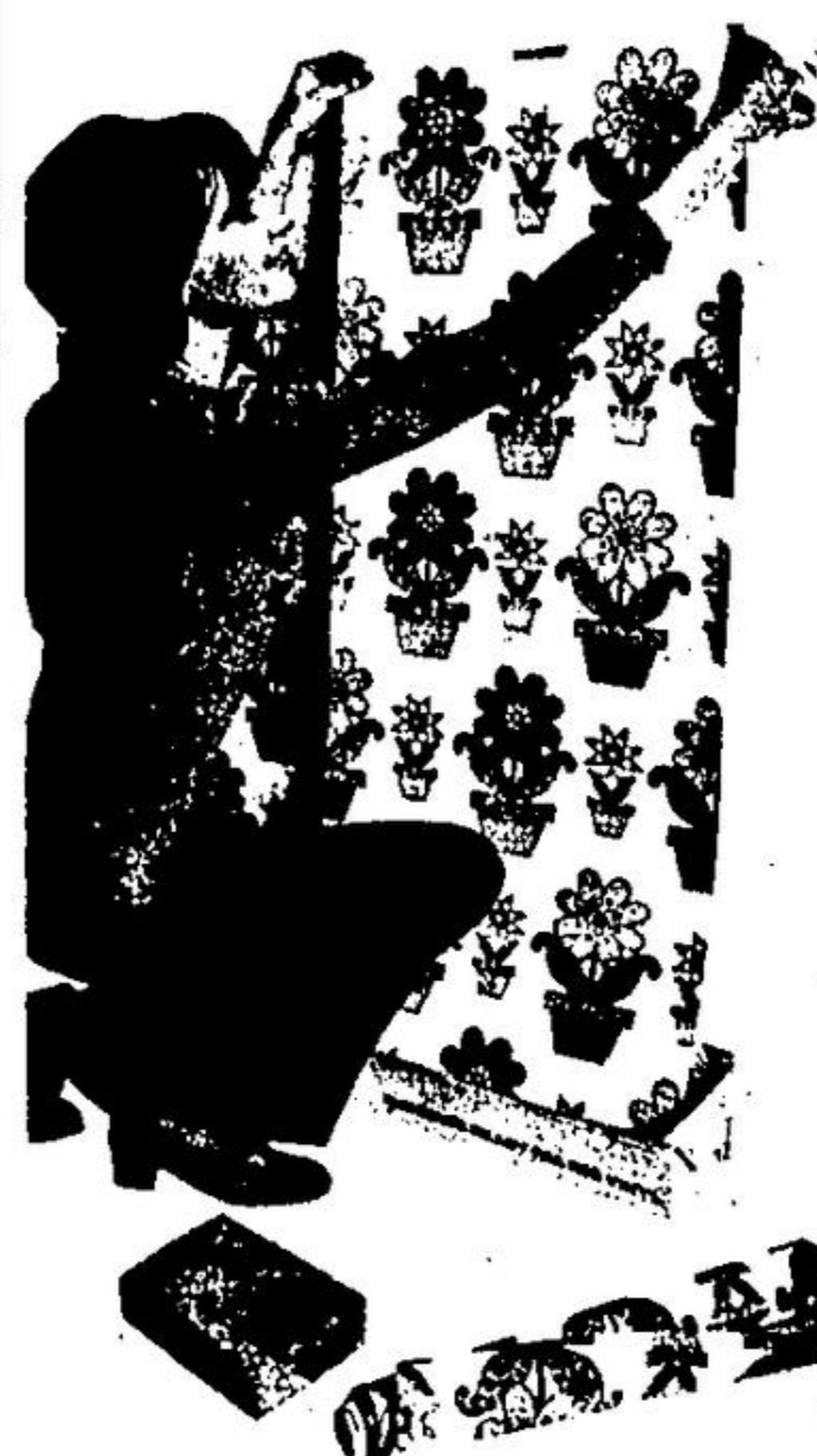


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
