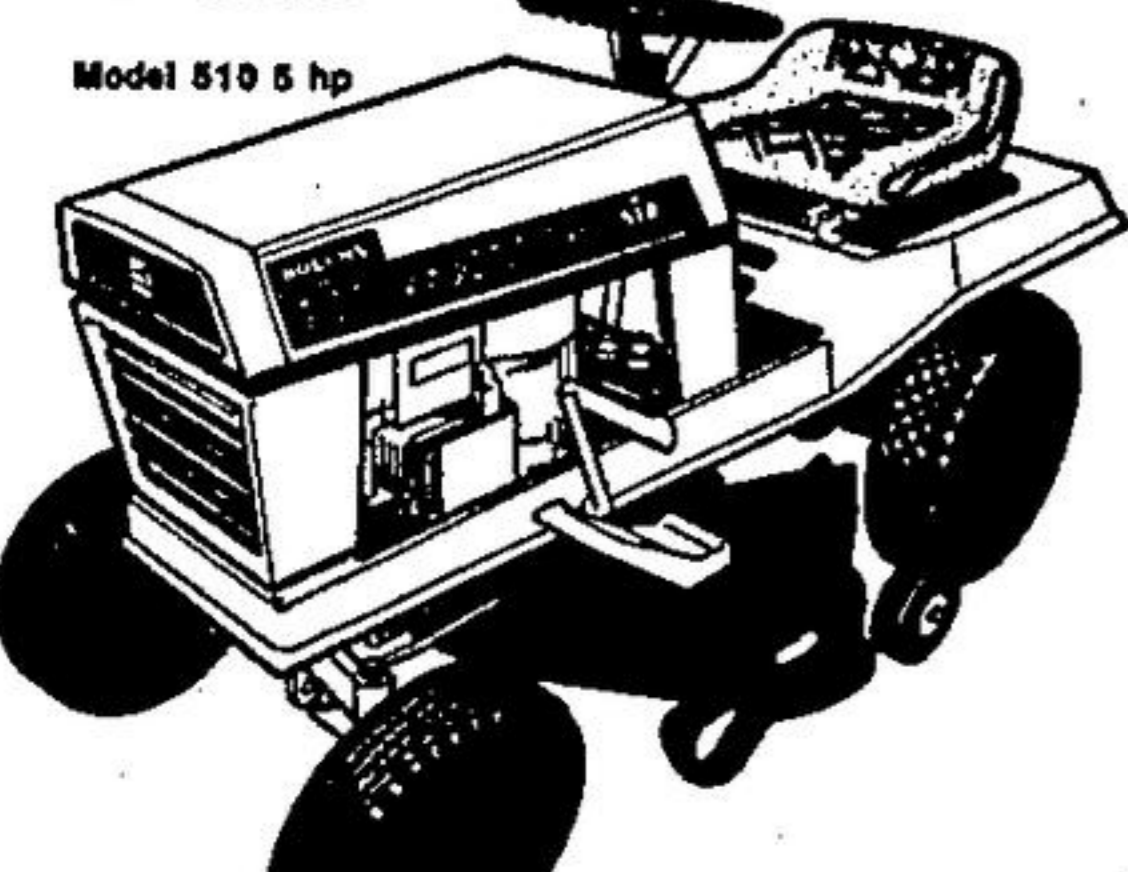

20,000 Sponsor Forms Circulate for Walkers

Twenty thousand sponsor forms and 10,000 information forms should now be available for Peel-Halton Miles for Millions Walk, this year entitled Y.O.U. walk. The walk organizers and beneficiaries are the same as last year, "Y" World Service Committee, OXFAM and UNICEF.

Last year the walk collected \$29,449.38, with expenses totalling \$650. This year's walk will follow the same route as last year, a distance of 26 miles. Starting points are at the Rosalea Arena in Brampton, and Holy Cross Church in Georgetown.

Receipts will be issued to sponsors for amounts of \$5 and over and certificates will be issued to walkers on completion of the walk. There will be no food at check points, but hot and cold drinks will be provided.

Pre-registration will take place on Thursday, May 3 at Rosalea Arena in Brampton, at St. John Fisher Church, Bramalea, and at the YMCA office on Wesleyan Street in Georgetown.

The walk itself will take place on Saturday, May 5 with collection day Saturday, May 12 at the before mentioned registration centres.

MOBILE UNITS
REACT (Communications Team from Toronto) will again provide assistance with 14 mobile units. They will provide the route to make sure all communication functions properly. St. John Ambulance will be in attendance along with the Brampton, Chinguacousy and O.P.P. police forces.

Four buses will be available to pick up walkers who waver. "The Barefoots", a Brampton musical group, will perform outside Rosalea Arena.
