Ancestor was Erin's First White Settler

A descendant of the first white settler in Erin Township, John Comfort Roszel, 16 Draper St., died in Georgetown hospital

Nathaniel Roszel received a land grant after fighting with General Brock in the War of 1812. The family granted land from their farm for a church, a cemetery, a school and a community hall. They originally came from the eastern seaboard of the United States as United Empire Loyalists in the 1790s and took up land near Twenty Mile Creek at Smithville in the Niagara peninsula.

Mr. Roszel was the son of Ira and Margaret Walker Roszel and was born in Erin Township 77 years ago. He attended Peacock and Blue Mountain schools. A veteran of army service in World War 1, he farmed on the family farm until 1919, then moved to Georgetown where he took a position with the electric radial company. He later operated his own cartage business, was employed with Abitibi Provincial Paper and at Greenwood Cemetery, and for several years with J. B. Mackenzie & Son lumber firm. He was last employed with Premier Products.

He was a member of Knox Presbyterian Church, an avid hockey fan and fond of gar-

He leaves his wife, Olive Eunice Waddell, whom he married in 1922 at Ballinafad Methodist manse, a daughter Margaret, of the staff of Cen-tennial School, and a sister Wilda, Mrs. Victor Harding of Guelph.
