In the zone F finals the team placed first with 3018 to earn the right to compete in the provincial finals.

Four Georgetown area schools played host to Young People's Theatre of Toronto in April, and students from another half-dozen schools will go to see the presentation of "Good Lord", a show which has been designed especially for children of Grades 4 and 5.

"Good Lord" is a contemporary presentation of some of the Bible's most memorable stories, in which characters such as Adam and

Eve, Cain and Abel — and yes, even God himself — speak in the colloquial language of today.

In what is known as the "story theatre" technique, music, sound effects, mime, dialogue and lots of action put the classic stories across in a way that makes both the characters and the conflicts relate to young audiences.

As in all Young People's Theatre productions for schools, the members of the company stay on hand after the performances for a free-wheeling talk session with the students. It's here the students have a chance to discuss what they have seen, even to argue with the interpretation or motivation — in short, to apply their own creative thinking to the situation — a valuable experience in the learning process.

"Good Lord" comes to Georgetown under the aegis of Prologue to the Performing Arts, the non-profit organization which makes concerts, dance, theatre and opera available to Boards of Education up and down the province.
