## Museum Notes

### To "Friends" This is Year of the Fountain

"The Friends of the Museum"—an auxiliary of the Halton County Museum, Kelso Park, Milton—held their first meeting of the year March 29 at the Halton County Administration Building. The officers for 1973 were elected: president, John McDonald, Georgetown; past-president, Mrs. Irene Saunders, Hornby; vice-president, Mrs. Judith Goebelle, Georgetown; auditor, Raymond Trace, Nassagaweya; historian, Ron Harris, Milton; museum rep. Mrs. J. Goebelle.

This organization is just entering its fourth year of operation, but is justly proud of its accomplishments thus far. During 1970 and 1971 it raised money for the rebuilding of an old log cabin on the museum grounds. County records show that the cabin was built in Nassagaweya Township in 1822. It was moved log-by-log to the museum complex and re-erected there by a group of the Friends and the museum carpenter, under the supervision of Museum Director, Dr. H. J. Newman.

**BUILD TERRACE**

Last year, the Friends raised sufficient funds to build a stone and woodwork terrace in front of the Barn—the main museum building. The project is being implemented by the museum staff this spring. Relaxing on the terrace with a cup of coffee after a tour, visitors will have a perfect vantage point from which to enjoy the museum gardens, with the bluffs of the Niagara escarpment in the background.

The Friends' slogan for 1973 is—"The Year of the Fountain." The fund-raising done this year will be for the installation of a fountain on the terrace next spring. This project will be engineered by the Halton Region Conservation Authority. The water used for the fountain will also activate the old water-wheel inside the Barn—built by the father of Georgetown's former Deputy-Reeve A. R. Speight.

The Friends of the Museum are holding their annual meeting May 3, and they look forward to renewing old acquaintances and welcoming new members.

The driver died with his neck caught in the door opening.

It was a one-in-a-billion accident. Unpredictable, almost unimaginable, if it hadn't actually happened. But the tragedy points up the fact that an automobile is an instrument of great power, and all power can turn to destruction if it gets out of control.

Respect your car! Respect it for the way it serves you: for the many taken-for-granted ways in which it can make your life easier, more enjoyable, more profitable. Respect it as a product of man's genius, progressively improved over two generations. But give it also the respect due to a source of power that is safe only while it is under complete control.
