Mrs. Bertha Devereaux Was Pioneer Descendant

Funeral service was held April 18, at the McClure Jones Funeral Home, 34 Edith Street, for Mrs. Bertha E. Devereaux, who died at the Maple View Lodge, Acton, April 14. Mrs. Devereaux was 88.

Born at Cheltenham the daughter of William Henry and Elizabeth Lyons, she attended school there and spent her early childhood on her parents' farm and in Brampton where she studied painting and music.

On June 11, 1913, she married Harry Devereaux who predeceased her in 1959.

After her marriage, she and her husband settled on a farm on the 5th Line of Esqueping Township, just south of Limehouse. In 1953 they retired and took up residence at 9 Parkview Boulevard, Georgetown, where she lived until 1971.

Mrs. Devereaux was a descendant through her mother of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Lyons, one of the pioneer families who came to Canada from Ireland in 1835 and settled on Crown Land, 4th Line West, Chinguacousy, Peel County.

Mrs. Devereaux did oil paintings in her early years which her family now have as cherished possessions. She was an ardent gardener and particularly enjoyed flowers.

Both she and her late husband were among the original supporters for the building of the Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital. They were a part of the rural community known as the Scotch Block, an area south-west of Georgetown, and Mrs. Devereaux was a charter member of the Scotch Block Circle of the Women's Association of Knox Presbyterian Church.

Mrs. Devereaux leaves two sisters, Mrs. M. William Henry (Ethel), and Mrs. William Hutchinson (May), both of Cheltenham.

She is also survived by three children, William A. of Halifax, Harry L. of Canboro, and Mrs. A. Kennedy Macnochie (Helen L.) of Montreal who at present is on sabbatical leave in London, England.

Rev. Peter Barrow of Knox Presbyterian Church conducted the service which was followed by interment in Greenwood Cemetery.

Funeral services were held for Jeffrey Brown, Ivan Crabtree, Clare Hutchinson, William Hutchinson, John McClure, and Harry Goring of New York. After the funeral, members of Scotch Block Circle served tea in Knox Presbyterian Church for those attending.
