Retardates' Residence No Closer to Reality

The six year battle by the North Halton Association for the Mentally Retarded to acquire land for a residence for the adult retarded, is no closer to reality now than it was six years ago.

Time after time the Association has tried to buy five or 10 acres of land, only to be turned down sometimes by the Ministry of Welfare and Social Services, as unsuitable, or as in the last case, opposed by the residents of the area.

At a meeting called by the residents, the proposed residence for approximately eight to 10 retarded adults was opposed by them. The residence would house some of the people now working at the A.R.C. Industries workshop at Hornby.

Says Pheasant Pens Could Be Problem

A dispute between neighbours on No. 5 Sideroad, could be termed "to be for the birds". Ronald Jeffrey, of No. 5 Sideroad, told Esquesing council he was afraid pheasants being built to house golden pheasants, could become objectionable, because of the number and size. He said they had been built without the township's knowledge. Jeffrey admitted the land owned by his neighbour Bill Donaldson was very attractive, and beautifully kept.

Donaldson told council he asked if a permit was necessary and was told it wasn't since the pens were only shelters without foundations, and mostly constructed of wire screening. He said the birds cannot be let out since the hawks would pick them up.

He breeds them for show purposes, on his one acre lot on No. 5 Sideroad, near the 7th Line. Donaldson told Cr. Wilfred Leslie the pens, all painted green, were the same as the ones Leslie used for keeping peacocks.

Cr. Dick Howitt wondered if it was an agricultural use. "If it isn't, I don't know what it is", replied Donaldson. He claimed the building inspector called the pens "rain shelters", so needed no permit.

Jeffrey pointed out Donaldson had done a wonderful job on his backyard, and was sure he would continue to do so, but said he was concerned if the land was sold, the buildings could be used to house rabbits, or be allowed to deteriorate.
