Remembered so well, of course, that in 1951 he marked up the biggest election victory in Ontario's history, taking 79 out of 90 seats.

premier was known as a kindly, sympathetic, most understanding, benevolent leader. But not to his supporters, his

Where the determination appeared most of all, however, was in pride of the Conservative party - the Ontario

Leslle and Gertrude Frost in their renowned marriage had no children.

On Mr. Frost's part he appeared to substitute the devotion, protection and affection of a fond parent for his children to his political party.

He would let nothing harm it. On the hustings the premier of the lifties would give powerful speeches, speeches that were mainly altuned to his image of a man of good will. However, when the party entered into them he could become a man of heat.

Four of his cabinet ministers - George Doucett, Philip Kelly, Clare Mapledoram and William Griesinger - got involved in problems which put a blemish on the party escutcheon.

They were sacrificed.

As the history books come out millions of words will be written about Leslie Frost. They will talk of a great politician and a man of achievement. But those that catch him most properly will talk of a determined man with an iron hand in a velvet glove.
