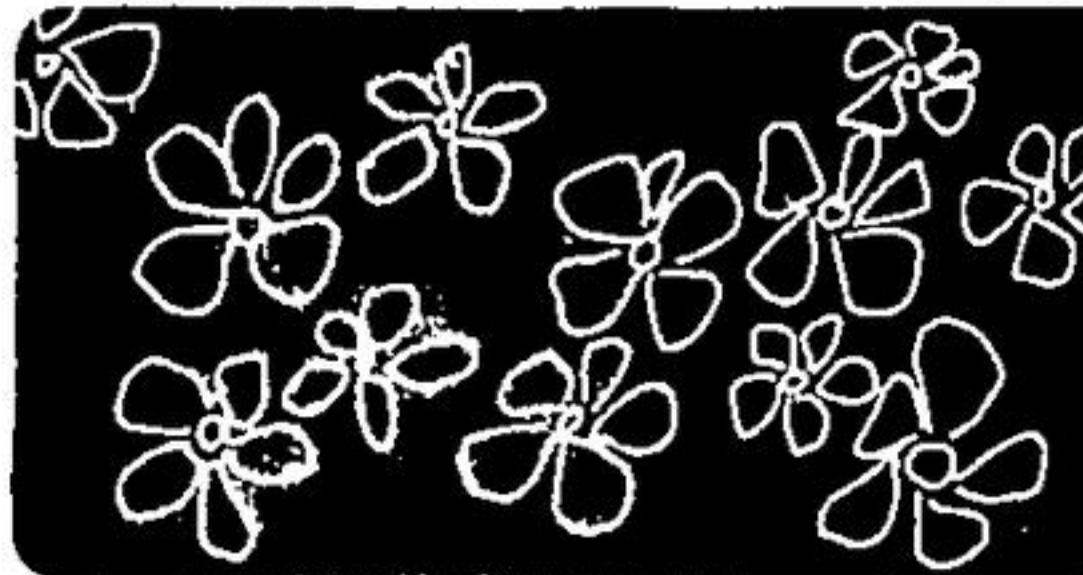
## WORK SHOP For Adult Retarded
