"I Didn't Believe it Until I Held Cheque" Says \$50,000 Winner

Thursday, May 26, will be a day never forgotten for Jimmy Linton and his wife Maxine of 6 Lyons Cr., the day they held a cheque for \$50,000 won in the Ontario Sports Lottery, right in their hands.

Mr. Linton received the word by phone, Wednesday night, after the draw was made at half time in the soccer game between Canada Selects and Arsenal at C.N.E. stadium, but thought someone was kidding him.

Al. S. Ballingall, Executive Director of Sports Lottery, who made the phone call, told him to look at his ticket and he would find Ballingall's name on it. He also told him Ron Breen of Greystone Cres., had sold him the ticket under the auspices by Georgetown Tennis club.

"At this point," Mr. Linton told The Herald, "I started to think it was true, but I didn't really believe it till Mr. Ballingall put the cheque in my hand Thursday morning."

When asked what he planned to do with the money, Mr. Linton replied, "I haven't a clue, but maybe I'll take Maxine on a trip to New Zealand, her native country."

FIRST TIME
The winner said it was the first time he had won anything, although he bought lots of tickets. As he said this he pulled a bunch of tickets out of his pocket.

Clutching the cheque, Mr. Linton shook his head in disbelief, and mumbled "I've never seen so much money in my life, and it's made out to me."

Mrs. Linton said, "I finally believed it when I held the cheque in my hot little hand." She said they were talking about a trip to New Zealand but wouldn't go till Christmas since that is the beginning of summer-time down under.

Frances, the Linton's 26 year old daughter, came home on the weekend from New York to

celebrate the big win, but son Ritchie, 20, a Waterloo Lutheran student is in Manitoba on an officer cadet training program.

The youngest daughter Jennifer, 18, a Grade 12 student at Georgetown high school, was the hardest to convince the whole thing wasn't a joke. She went to bed the night of the phone call still doubting it was real.

FORGOT ABOUT IT
Mr. Linton bought the ticket some months ago from Ron Breen a co-worker at North Halton Ford, and claims he had forgotten all about it.

Mr. Breen, who lives at 47 Greystone, was also a winner, receiving \$5,000 as the seller of the winning ticket. He didn't tell his wife anything about it, till Thursday morning when he was handed the cheque. "Just

in case it wasn't true, I didn't want her to get her hopes up," he explained.

"We're thinking of finishing off the basement," said Breen when asked what he planned to do with the money, "but probably my wife Beverly has plans for it, besides." His three children Cheryl, 17, Steve, 15, and Jason, 3, have also supplied some ideas.

Owners of North Halton Ford, Jim Bowles and Russ Robertson tried to talk to Jimmy Linton into buying a Lincoln Mark IV to help spend the money, but car-salesman Linton wasn't sold.

The Lintons came to Georgetown from New Zealand in 1947, but Mr. Linton's accent betrays his Scottish birth. He comes from Selkirk, Scotland, near Abbotsford, the home of Sir Walter Scott.

Teachers Group Want President Teach Half Time

Georgetown trustee Ernie Bodnar told the Halton Board of Education last Thursday, that he would not like to see militancy in Halton as is the "deplorable" situation in Scarborough.

This was expressed in relation to a recommendation from the Ontario Secondary School Teachers Federation, District Nine, that the president of the federation teach half time and the federation pay the rest of his or her salary. This is to be reviewed in the spring of 1974.

Scarborough is now on strike and the president of their district is full time. Director of

education, James W. Singleton, clarified the issue by stating that such a recommendation would not necessarily lead in that direction. Other questions brought forward were how would this affect the head of a department and could a teacher take a semester off in a semesters school. It was added that this would have to be with the principal's approval as was originally intended in the recommendation.

It was approved for review, with board members expressing that this would be better for the pupils, the office of president being time consuming.

Urge Council To Reconsider Co-Ordinator Damage \$2,775 Rural Mishaps

Georgetown recreation committee has asked council to reconsider the hiring of a recreational program co-ordinator for the town.

This was agreed upon at last week's committee meeting. The request states that the need for such a position is real and urgent. Motion 24 for such an office went to council May 7 and was on a tie vote.

The candidate in this position would start at level II of the town's grading system; would be someone from a community college with a year's experience, and would make \$7500 to \$8000 a year.

The reason for the level II rating is so the person would be a level below the arena manager and could work up to a 12 level keeping uniformity in the department.

Recreation director Doug Collison told the committee he had four applicants for the job and hadn't advertised.

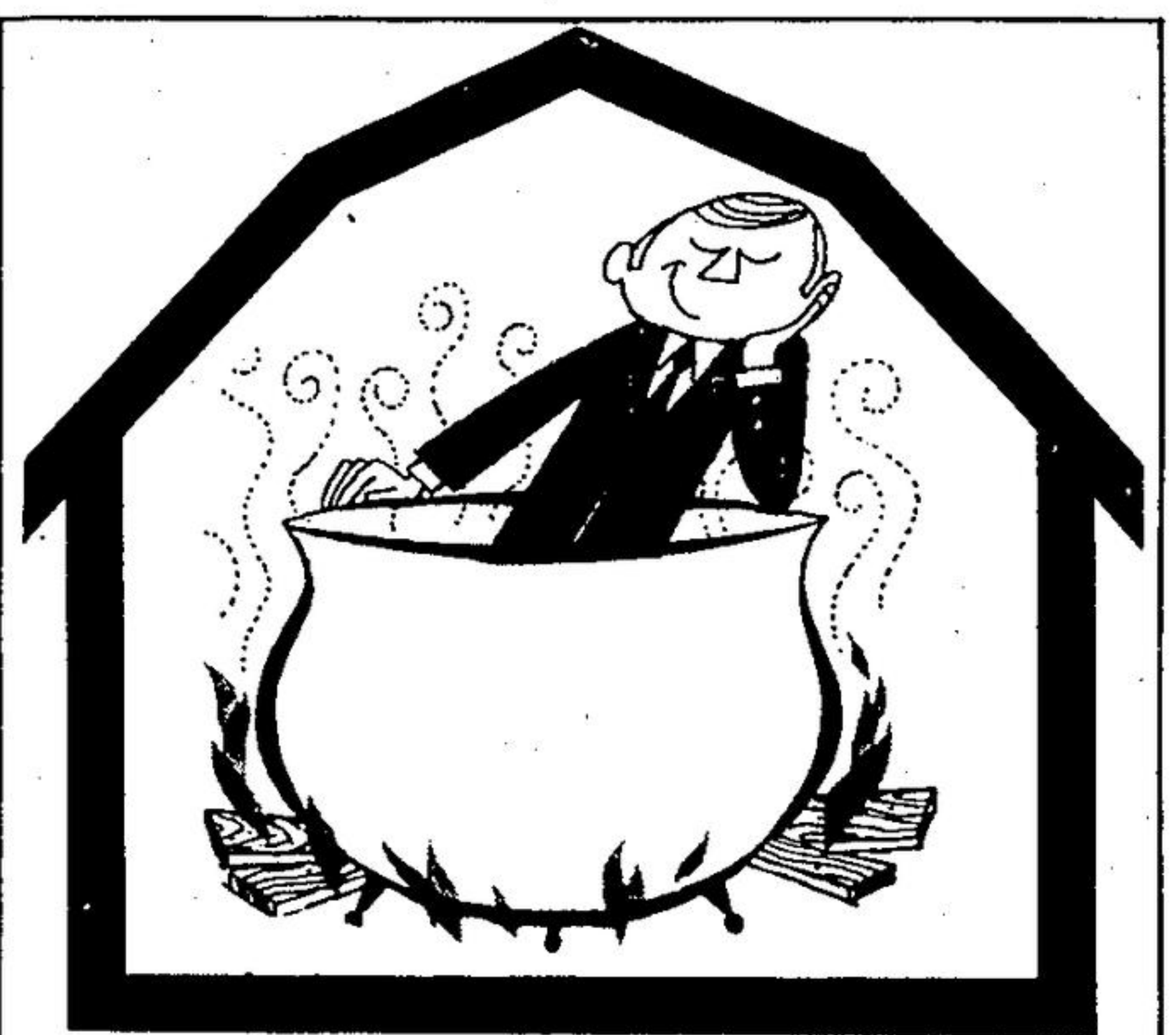
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
