

TUBBY TWINS COMING

Big Boys Benny and Billy Will Wrestle Wednesday

What weighs 1,420 pounds and has four arms and four legs? A pair of the world's heaviest wrestlers, that's what. And they'll be here June 6 to take part in a wrestling card at the Georgetown Memorial Arena.

Benny and Billy McGuire, identical twins, age 26, are the two heavyweights. In age and looks, they're almost indistinguishable, but you can tell them apart by their size. Billy weighs 720 pounds; Benny tips the scales at only 700 pounds.

What makes a 700-pound wrestler? In this case, it was German measles. The twins entered the world at about five pounds apiece, and grew normally, at their home in Hendersonville, N.C., until the age of 10.

They contracted German measles together, and their pituitary glands (which regulate nutrition of bone and other tissues) went berserk. By the time the pair was in high school, their individual weights were at the 450-pound mark. It was in high school that the two became active in wrestling, although Benny admitted to a much earlier desire to take up the sport.

"We were undefeated in high school wrestling," Billy recalled, and Benny was quick to add that they are undefeated in professional wrestling as well, except for George.

Following high school, the twins centred their interest on professional wrestling, and followed professional matches faithfully. They were signed by a promoter and have been on the go in Canada and the United States for the past half-dozen years. For the past three years, most of their wrestling bouts have been in Canada.

The sport has not been all that easy on either of them, although both admit it is profitable. Billy has suffered cracked ribs, a broken nose, missing teeth, and even broke an arm and a leg when he took a tumble out of the ring.

Benny hasn't broken as many bones, but he has suffered a gouged eye ("A wrestler got me with a pair of scissors,") and has had broken fingers. Treatment for a blood clot on the knee kept him out of the ring for three weeks once.

Georgetown Tykes All Stars lost a one run decision to Streetsville in the opening game of their 1973 schedule last week.

Streetsville pushed across the winning run in the bottom half of the seventh inning in fashioning a 12-11 victory.

Georgetown showed some first game jitters and allowed Streetsville to score twice in the opening inning. The locals rebounded to tie it in the second inning, and a grand slam homerun by Danny Reynolds put Georgetown into a 6-3 lead in the third which they extended to 7-3 in the same frame.

Streetsville turned on the offense and jetted into an 11-7 lead.

Georgetown tied the game in the top of the 7th inning, but were unable to keep Streetsville off the score sheet in their half.

Georgetown standouts included pitchers Brian Ellis and Lance Doucette, who allowed 10 hits between them. Steve Frawley, who was involved in six plays at first, and Danny Reynolds, who went two for four at bat. Brian Ellis went two for three.

Rains cancelled the Waterdown, at Georgetown game which was to have been the home opener on Saturday.

"We hope to keep wrestling for another four years," Billy said. Then, the two plan to undergo special surgery that will shorten their intestinal tracts and, hopefully, bring their weights down to about 300 pounds each.

"And we'll keep on wrestling," Benny said. Despite their projected weight loss, the two brothers see heavyweights moving more and more into the wrestling field, with weights predominant at 250 pounds or more.

The brothers pack a lot of personality into their big frames. They're married (to Montreal sisters) and their wedding was a wrestling first, in a ring at El Paso, Texas.

Benny, who says he likes "fat girls," is married to Maryse, who weighs 120 pounds, and Billy is married to Danielle, at 110 pounds.

The couples spend the wrestling season in Canada and the off-seasons in the United States. Making plans, the brothers already have acquired some farm property, and a small cattle herd as well. Their future plans even include a steak house, with king-sized steaks.

And that brings us to the subject of food. Each can consume a dozen eggs, three pounds of bacon, a loaf of toast and two or three quarts of orange juice for breakfast.

Dinner is just as heavy, with steaks numbering four or five, complete with half a dozen baked potatoes and another loaf of bread each.

Their 700 pounds of bodily weight are easily apparent in their waist sizes. Each has a girth of about 84 inches.

Besides wrestling, the two like motorbiking, and they've got a pair of mini-bikes to prove their interest. In 1971, the two cycled across the United States in 30 days (averaging about 100 miles per day) and went from winter-like extremes in the east to desert-like conditions in the west.

Getting around to matches the pair relies on a matched set of cars, specially-built 1 Detroit, with enlarged doors, truck springs and extended brake and accelerator pedals. The front seat, reinforced, has been moved back to touch the rear seat in each car.

Only one car of the 1973 pair remains, however, because one was wrecked last week in a six-car pileup on the Burlington Skyway.

When the brothers fly, they have to pay a fare and a half each. And they have to squeeze down the aircraft aisles sideways to get to their seats.

During the Georgetown match, the brothers will wrestle Bad Bill Coleman and Hoehman Bull.

Wrestling fans can watch the antics of the brothers for such favorite holds as the locomotive (smashing an opponent bodily into the turnbuckles), the pumpkin squeeze (which our page 1 picture illustrates) and the splash (which usually ends the match).

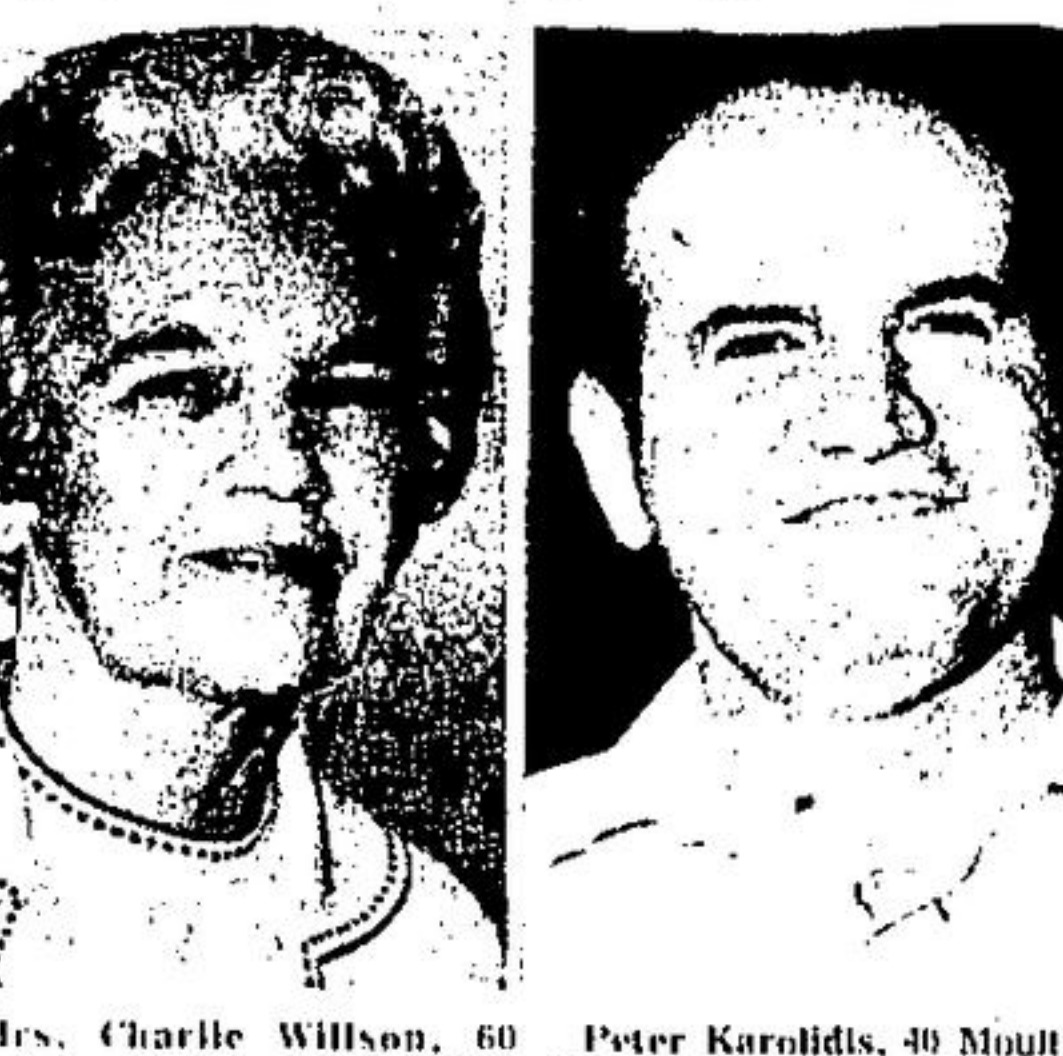
The pair will be in Georgetown well before the start of the matches. They plan to ride their mini-bikes around the streets of town, to meet people. "We like to meet folks," said Benny, "and they enjoy meeting us."
