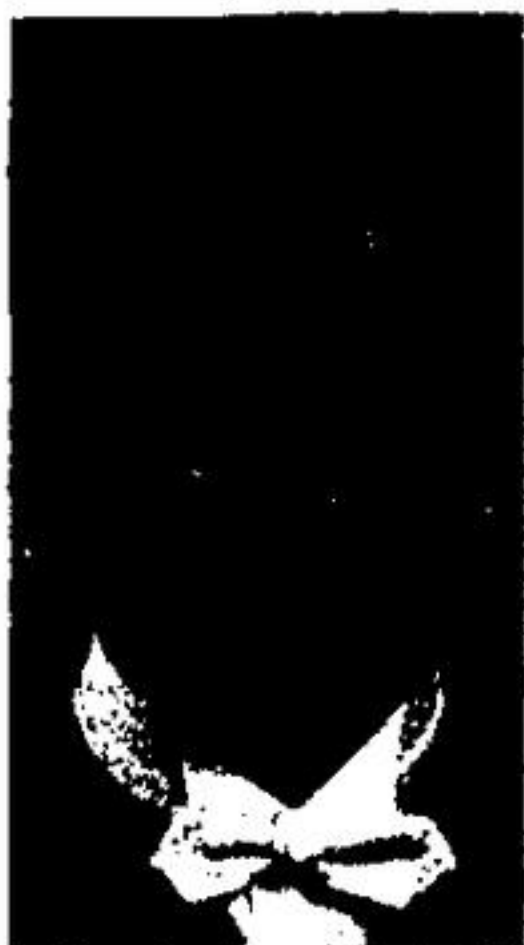
GRADUATES

YACMR Works For Retarded

YACMR represents Youth Across Canada With the Mentally Retarded, and is a program of youth service whereby special projects of assistance are started and carried out for the mentally retarded of all ages.

In Georgetown, the emphasis, June 9 and 10, will be on fund raising. The local branch is new, and to raise operating funds, it will receive soft drink profits from the A&W Restaurant on Guelph Street during the two days.

Owner Ray Charron, a newcomer to Georgetown, is turning over the soft drink profits to assist the group. Martin Blakesley, Georgetown YACMR

treasurer, said the group hopes to encourage participation by more young people, and at the same time, further the cause of public acceptance of mental retardation.

Richard DeGroat, YACMR president, said the encouragement is also made to have the retarded accept the services offered. Some of the projected activities of the group include swimming programs, athletic events, and even taking adults to dances.

Mr. Charron said he considers the group worthy of his support. He has two members on his staff who are members of YACMR and he said he is aware of their efforts.

YACMR hopes to distribute a handbill to every home in Georgetown, with two purposes in mind. It wants to explain the organization's function, and attract customers to the drive-in restaurant.

"We'll tell the community we're here", said Martin.

He said any amount of money the group raises during the two days of June will be an asset. Mr. Charron will turn over 15 cents per jumbo drink and 10 cents for each regular soft drink sold.
