## Halton Liberals Choose RR 2 Georgetown Woman

The Halton and Halton East Liberal Association began last week to prepare for the next election, whenever it comes. At its annual meeting in Trafalgar Hall, Wednesday, June 13, the association acclaimed Elizabeth Robson, RR2 Georgetown, as its president. Mrs. Robson is Burlington town solicitor. In 1967 she was the first woman town solicitor in Ontario. Oakville lawyer Murray

Haesler dropped out of the race before the balloting. Halton Liberals also acclaimed four vice-presidents: Grant Caseley, of Georgetown; Bern Burrows, of Erin; John Gams, of Oakville; and Judy Savage, also of Oakville; a treasurer, Don Anderson; and a secretary, Mrs. Jackie O'Connor. Frank Allan was elected to the newly-created post of executive vice-president.

The association also pushed through a series of amendments to its constitution intended to strengthen its forces before they hit the streets for votes again. In addition to creating the position of executive vice-president, who will be able to act for the president when he is absent, the association also moved to require a 100 per cent riding residency qualification for voting at nomination meetings. The move cuts off the possibility of candidates importing supporters from outside the riding.

Federal communications minister Gerard Pelletier, the scheduled speaker, didn't show up because of government business. But the speakers who were there — former Halton Liberal MP Rud Whiting among them — said repeatedly that the "big blue machine" that vaulted Progressive Conservatives Jim Snow (Halton East) and Terry O'Connor (Halton) into office is showing signs of weakening.
