Doctor Longtime Resident Of The Georgetown Region

Dr. Armitage Edward Litton Forbes died in Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital, June 27, the age of 87. He was born in Ireland, was the son of Dr. A.L.A. Forbes of London, Eng. His mother's maiden name is M. Dueroq of Boulogne, France.

He had lived in Ireland, England, Scotland, and Africa. He retired to Toronto in 1946 and moved to Norval in the late 1940s.

Dr. Forbes attended King Edward Grammar School in Birmingham, Eng., Royal Dental College in Edinburgh, and the University of Edinburgh Medical School. He spent four years in dentistry in Kenya, 19 years as senior medical officer in Britain and was in the colonial service in Nigeria.

He served in both world wars as a captain. The first war was spent as a dentist in France and the second in North Africa, primarily in Ethiopia with the Royal Medical Corps.

Dr. Forbes once acted as an interpreter for Haile Selassie. He was a noted linguist, fluent in three languages, and having a working knowledge of seven others.

Two sisters survive him, Mrs. Melanie Primmer of Cambridge, Eng., and Miss Charlotte Forbes of Bexhill, Eng., Sister Louise, of New Zealand, and brother Arthur of Toronto predeceased him.

Funeral services took place at the McClure Jones Funeral

Home in Georgetown, June 4. Rev. R. Huggie of St. Paul's Anglican Church, Norval, and Rev. H. Smith of Norval Presbyterian Church conducted the services. Pallbearers were Andrew Blinoff of Toronto, John Rowe of Toronto, William Boos of Brampton, Tom Pettingill, Ormie Carter, and David Carter of Norval. Burial was in Hillcrest Cemetery, Norval.
