

Tykes Pushing for Top With Two League Wins

4 Homers Don't Help

With two league wins in the past week, the GBA tyke allstars are pushing their way to the top of the eight-team league.

The first game, on Tuesday, was a convincing 22-7 win over Chingacousy, with Brian Ellis pitching a two-hitter and Mike Hartley leading the way with a four-for-four night at bat.

Mike Makovnyk also had a good night at bat, two for four. Danny Reynolds was two for three. With such a high scoring match, the winners managed to play everyone in the game, including two new boys, Don Itca and Mike Miehlm.

In the second league game of the week, the team ran its record to five wins and three losses by dumping the league leading Burlington club 6-4. The game was highlighted by good team defensive effort. Against Lance Doucette's fine pitching effort, over six innings, and Mike Hartley's relief work, Burlington managed only two hits. The club struck out nine times.

Next league game is June 29 at home, against Dundas.

On Saturday, the club travelled to Guelph for the Guelph Kinsmen tyke tourney.

Playing three games in one day, the team managed one win and two losses, to advance to the semi-finals of the consolation round.

In the first game against Scarborough Village, the score seasawed back and fourth through five innings to a 9-8 score. A busy fifth inning saw Scarborough score eight runs against the home club. The tyke couldn't come back, and dropped the game 17-9.

The loss dropped the club into the consolation round, and in the next game, the team was pitted against Walkerton. In this match, the club took a 10-1 lead into the fifth inning, when Brian Ellis' pitching arm became tired, and the other team scored six runs.

In the last game of the day, the team met Welland. The long day in the sun and the previous

two games took their toll, and a tired tyke team dropped an 8-3 decision to a stronger Welland team.

Welland managed three inning-ending double plays on pop flies to the infield. In each case, while a batter was out, a runner also was put out before he could return to the base.

This killed three rallies.

Top players of the day were Donnie Rae, batting two for two in the second game, Duane Hatcher getting a single as he pinch-hit with a count of one ball and two strikes on the original batter, Brian Ellis hitting two for three in the Welland game, and a very good batting effort for the entire team, when, in the last two games, the opposing pitchers managed only three strikeouts against the club.

Delrex Sunoco defeated Comfi Furniture 7-2 in Tyke House League action, June 18, and Crawford's won over Harley Motors 13, with the losing club picking up four homers in the final inning.

Rexway BP had its winning way over Irwin Dorsey, taking a 16-2 victory.

Despite some high scores, the teams are considered to be well matched.

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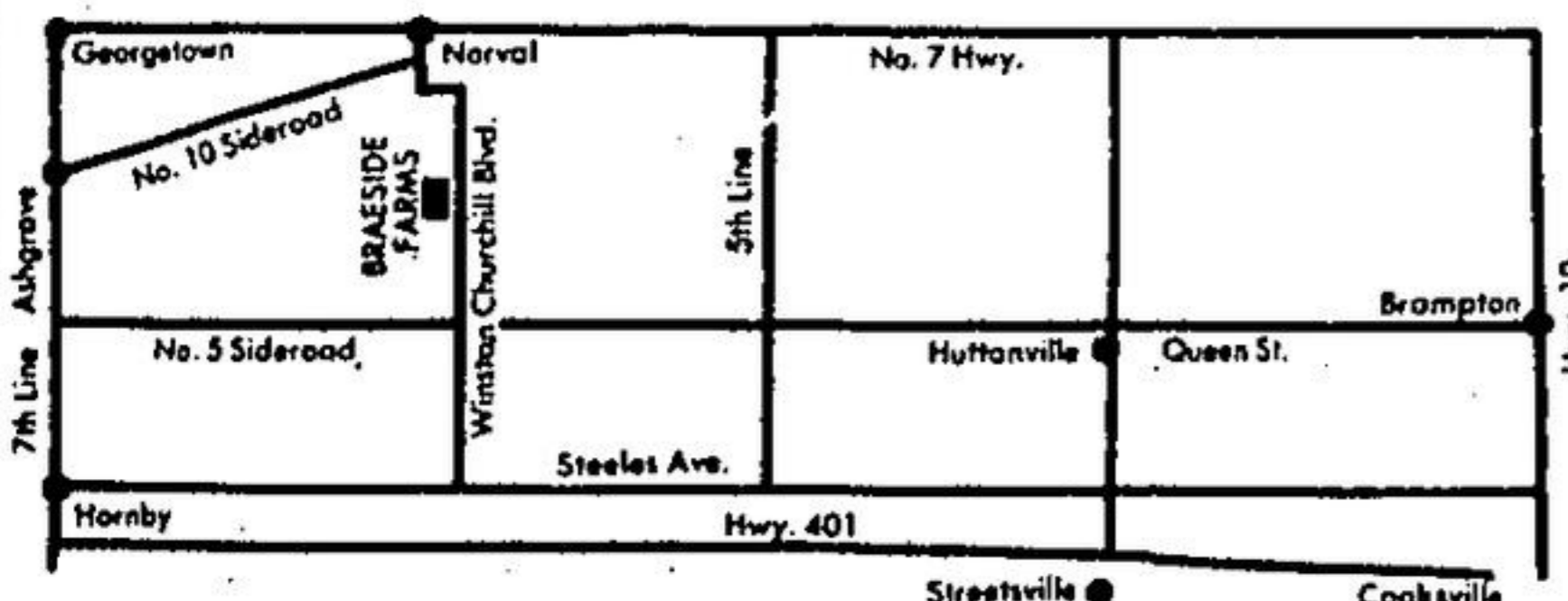
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
