CLERGY COMMENT Self-Giving Unceasing To Be Truly Christian

It is easy to say to someone else: "Pull yourself together; stop worrying about it. Everything will work out all right." Some people imagine that once they have said this much, they have completely discharged their duty toward a friend. Isn't it interesting how simple it is for most of us to endure the sorrows and bear the burdens of OTHERS? As long as it is somebody else's problem, it is easy. "Just forget about it," is easy advice. We can give it so readily.

The advice that is often easy to give is very difficult to accomplish. There is much more needed than that if we are to be of any real service to someone in need.

We can observe sympathy shooting forth from the eyes of the person we are asking for help; when we feel tangible support of outstretched arms, when we witness the sacrifice of personal comfort and convenience, only then will the words that come from the lips lift the burden and encourage the spirit.

The key idea is a willingness to give of ourselves. This means no office hours, no pat answers, no indicated preconceived methods. Giving of self can keep no Sabbath or be restricted to appointed times of special circumstances.

To be truly Christian this self-giving is unceasing. It is ready to all at all times, in all places, under all circumstances. Let me suggest that it begins in the first waking moment with a pleasant greeting and cheerful good wishes.

Then it goes on throughout the rest of the day in courtesies, thoughtful attentions, patience, and helpfulness. It goes everywhere with cordiality, its gladness of heart, its uplift.

Broken hearts and bruised spirits are hard to mend. But if there is any cure or relief, it is to be found in the big heart, the helping hand, the physical presence and only then in the kind word.
