Funeral service was held last Friday at the McClure-Jones Funeral Home in Georgetown for Hiram Henry Bauer, 77, who died July 4 at Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital.

Rev. Harold Martin of St. John's United Church conducted the 11 a.m. service. Because there was no graveside service, there were no pallbearers or flower-bearers. Burial was in Greenwood Cemetery.

Mr. Bauer was born in Kitchener, the son of William Edward Bauer and Mary Erb. He lived in Irvine, Alta., from 1920 to 1939; Medicine Hat, Alta., from 1939-55, and in Georgetown from 1955 until the time of his death. He was employed as a stockkeeper with

Jaycees and Health Unit Have Produced Directories

Georgetown now has two directories in circulation. One put out by the Jaycees and the other prepared by the Halton County Health Unit. The Jaycee directory is on sale for \$1 per book and the county directory is circulated to community service organizations.

The Jaycee directory is a 56 page booklet published with a theme around the Annual Crazy Boat Races, which took place April 7 of this year. The directory lists the emergency service telephone numbers on page 5. It also contains advice about antidotes for poisons, mouth to mouth artificial respiration, it lists Georgetown council members, community organizations, schools, churches, professionals, local boards, as well as an index of the streets and a map of Georgetown on the two centre pages. Advertisers in the directory are listed on page 32 and advertisements placed throughout the book.

Criticism of the directory could be that the balance between the crazy boat race theme and community knowledge is weak. There is more than enough crazy boating information, compared to community knowledge.

There are 14 pages of theme including the front cover, and 26 pages index and messages. The remainder of the book is

advertising. There could be more explanation of services listed. Pieces about the crazy boat race fail to give credits, and it would be of interest to the reader to know who was the creative talent behind some good poetry. A picture of the present main street would have been appropriate on a page opposite the picture of the Georgetown main street at the turn of the Century.

The directory sponsored by the Halton County Health Unit is for Halton County and while it lacks any local flavor it is comprehensive in listing all available services. The one major exception is that some of Halton's municipal newspapers are listed. This directory may not be as readily available but it does give a comprehensive analysis of services listed.
