Meet Your Police

Fire Loss Takes Jump

The fire tally for June is up considerably from that month last year, because of a fire at Pompei Pizzeria which effected an additional 10 businesses in the Moore Park shopping plaza. The fire department also reports one person taken to hospital because of gasoline fumes.
Estimated damage last month is \$13,450. Last year it was \$650. Total damages estimated to date this year are \$69,800 and last year at this time \$80,640.

There was a total of 19 fires for the month of June, 18 in Georgetown and one in Esquesing. This is a substantial increase over last year when June had eight fires, six in Georgetown and two in Esquesing. Total fires to date 79, which is close to par with last year, totalling 71.

Fires for June are 15 building fires, one open fire and three others.

Deaf School Contract Let

James Snow, Minister of Government Services, said this week that a \$149,963 contract has been awarded to H. Facini Construction Services Limited, 18 Haas Road, Rexdale, for construction of a new underground steam distribution system at the Ontario School for the Deaf, Milton.

Facini Construction Services submitted the lowest of nine bids, the high being \$187,661.
The current contract award covers the third and final stage of a program of which stages I and II are already complete to replace the existing badly deteriorated steam and condensate pipes and protective conduit, which supply heat to the school's heating, ventilating and domestic hot water systems.

Work on the project is expected within approximately three months.
